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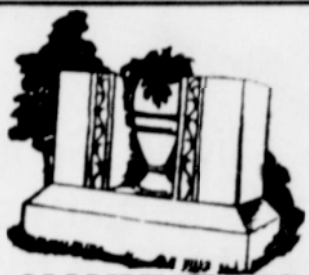
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Lanes Honored on 50th Wedding Anniversary

Overseas Mail Regulations Told

Ashland Postmaster E. E. Vail today issued a reminder that October 15 to November 15 is the period for Christmas mailing to armed forces overseas. This includes members of the armed forces, their families and authorized civilians who receive their mail at an APO or Fleet PO address, Vail said.

Parcels for delivery in Japan, Korea and islands in the Pacific should be mailed as soon as possible, preferably not later than November 1.

Size and weight restrictions are the same for Christmas overseas packages as for regular domestic parcel post with a limit of 70 pounds. Other containers for overseas parcels must be of wood, metal or other solid material and be securely tied in addition to being sealed with gummed tape, according to post office department regulations.

The full address as well as the sender's complete return address must be clearly shown on the package.

Prohibited articles include matches, lighter fluid, cigarettes and other tobacco products in addition to articles regularly prohibited in domestic mail.

Vail pointed out that all greeting cards going overseas must bear 3 cents postage rather than the 2 cents allowed within the United States.

Parking Lights No Good in Fog

Salem, Oct. 18—Oregon motorists were warned today that keeping another driver in the fog, so to speak, can lead to some very serious trouble not only for themselves but others as well. The warning came from Captain Walter Lansing, department of state police.

Many drivers, Lansing said, use only parking lights in the fog—a practice that is a violation of state law as well as a definite driving hazard.

Parking lights, Lansing said, do not have enough intensity to illuminate the road properly in normal weather let alone in foggy conditions.

He pointed out that state law requires lights to be so aimed and with enough power to reveal an object at least 500 feet ahead. Parking lights far from fill the bill, he concluded.

Speech Clinic Started at SOC

Special speech instruction is now being offered by Leon Mulling, assistant professor of speech at Southern Oregon college.

A new speech clinic is being set up to offer aid to students who experience difficulty in speaking. Group classes will be organized for those with voice disorders and for students from foreign countries.

Since facilities are limited, Mulling said it will be impossible to offer aid to members of the community at present, however, those wishing special speech instruction are requested to see him at the college. A waiting list is now being made.

Mulling has returned to SOC after a year's leave of absence during which time he did extensive study in his field at Stanford.
