**Russia Described  
For Kiwanis Club**

The geography of Russia and a description of the country's natural resources and industrial development was outlined for members of the Kiwanis club at their meeting at the Elks lounge Monday noon by Dr. Herbert Vent, instructor of physical science at Southern Oregon college.

Russia has an area of over 8 million square miles—almost three times that of the United States—and a population of over 210 million, compared with a US population of about 160 million. Although most of Russia's population is concentrated in the European portion of the country, tremendous growth is taking place in the Asiatic area immediately east of the Ural mountains where huge new industrial centers have been developed in recent years.

Dr. Vent divided the country into geographic regions, pointing out that with its vastness, Russia has a wide range of climatic conditions and a resultant wide range of natural resources and agricultural production.

The very size of the country gives Russia the advantage of defense in depth which was employed during World War II and the disadvantage of difficult transportation problems. With industrial centers widely separated and intermediate areas often economically unfit for development, Russia is today faced with a completely inadequate transportation system, Dr. Vent said.

Guests of the club were Merle A. Montgomery, visiting Kiwanian from Bellingham, Wash., Donald MacDougall, instructor of social science at Southern Oregon college and Elvin Pesenti, new owner of Whittle Transfer company.

Abe M. Neslin presided at the meeting in place of President Ed Barnett. Dr. Vent was introduced by George Backes, program chairman.

Upon assurance from City Attorney Harry A. Skerry Jr. that expenditures from the city's emergency fund for civil defense would be legal, the council authorized a budget item of \$500 for such expenses.

Col. P. B. Waterbury, civil defense head, said funds were necessary to carry out the program. Items needed include registration cards for volunteer workers, defense sirens, reserve ammunition, street markers and a telephone for civil defense headquarters, he said.

After a lengthy discussion, the council decided to follow the recommendation of the city planning commission and set a January 1 deadline for L. R. Alexander, 1604 Ashland street, to comply with the zoning ordinance. Alexander, a logging contractor, is alleged to be operating a commercial garage within the city limits.

The council further stipulated that work could only be done on Alexander's own equipment and no work could be done after 10 p.m.

An ordinance authorizing sale of city-owned timber to the interior department for \$32,844.72 was passed by the council. Funds derived from the sale will be used to cover the city reservoir and replace pipeline from the reservoir.

The council was informed that Ray Frisbie had requested permission from the state department to move above-ground oil storage tanks to a location outside the city limits. Erection of the tanks was protested by residents last month and two weeks ago the council was advised the present location does not meet specifications required by the state fire marshal.

Financial reports for the month of September were accepted by the council.
