Exhaust Fumes Increase Winter Driving Hazards

Drivers... beware! Last year 254 persons died due to motor exhaust fumes in the nation. The carbon monoxide gas contained in the fumes is odorless, colorless, and induces drowsiness. Because of the latter, even though the amount breathed is not enough to be fatal, in itself, a serious accident may result because of the effect.

The traffic safety division of the secretary of state's office urges motorists to keep a window slightly open to allow fresh air even in the coldest weather. It further advised the following safe-driving tips:

1. Keep windshields and windows clear of fog or frost.
2. Slow down well in advance of intersections and curves.
3. Avoid sudden starting and stopping on slippery surfaces. Apply brakes with a pumping action to avoid skidding.
4. Keep far enough behind the vehicle ahead to allow you to stop safely if necessary.

Continued Cold Forecast Here

Local residents, viewing surrounding snow-covered mountains, will have no difficulty agreeing with the weather man's current forecast of continued cold weather.

The western Oregon forecast through November 19, according to the Medford weather bureau, calls for recurring periods of mixed rain and snow with temperatures several degrees below normal. Afternoon readings will be in the 40's, dropping to the low 30's at night.

Northern California's forecast is for intermittent rains in moderate to heavy amounts, possibly clearing Saturday or Sunday. Temperatures will be below normal with lows probably near freezing in the valleys.

Traffic Deaths in State on Increase

Oregon's traffic deaths continue to increase over last year's statistics, reports Earl T. Newby, secretary of state.

October claimed 41 lives which swelled the year's total to 333. This is a 17 per cent increase over the same month last year. Newby said, "If this trend continues during the remainder of the year, it will wipe out all of the traffic death reduction earned in 1949 and set Oregon back to its 1948 level."

Driving conditions this time of year, he said, are made more dangerous by the early darkness and frequent storm conditions. "It's the wrong season," Newby concluded, "for continuing to drive at summer speeds."
