Study Club Hears Book Review at Monday Meeting

The life of Martin Luther was depicted in a book review given by Mrs. Will Dodge at a meeting of the Ashland Study club at the home of Mrs. Roger Rath, 1424 Siskiyou, last Monday.

The book reviewed by Mrs. Dodge was Gladys H. Barr's "Monk in Armor." This book presents a side of a great leader not usually found in historical accounts, said Mrs. Dodge. "The author," she continued, "begins her story with the lad, Martin, 12, in the year 1595."

Mrs. Dodge stated that an interesting picture was given of Luther's early years with the next account of his life taking place in a German university. "Luther is torn between his desire to continue his study of law, leading to wealth," she said, "and a feeling that he should dedicate his life to the church."

Luther then enters a monastery but does not obtain any peace of mind. Years of teaching follow at the University of Wittenberg. His work here leads to the events which bring about the period of the reformation with Luther as its leader.

"The author finishes her story with the marriage of Luther," Mrs. Dodge related, "although much of his greatest work was done in his later life. The book is not a complete biography but rather a novel which has for its purposes the stimulating of greater interest in this period of history and to further the study of the great leader."

Besides Mrs. Dodge's review, Mrs. Rath chose for her half-hour topic, excerpts from the book, "Seeds of Treason," by Ralph de Toledaus and Victor Loshy. A member of the group described this talk as most interesting about the true story of the Hiss-Chambers trial.

During the convention, the Ashland members presented a tribute to past chairmen. A banquet followed in the evening with musical numbers.

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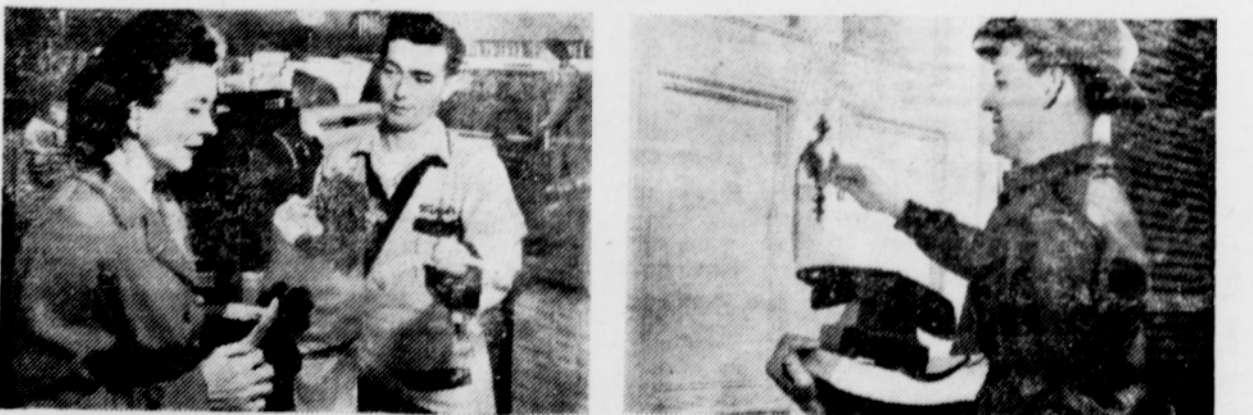

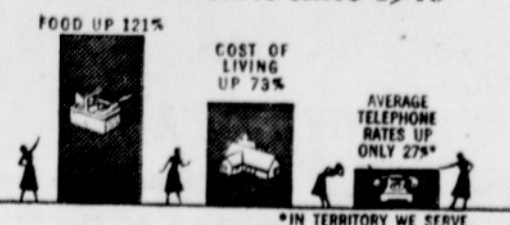
