County School Census up 747

Medford, Nov. 21—Jackson county now has 15,756 children between the ages of four and 20, according to the findings of the 1950 school census just completed.

Figures released from the office of School Superintendent C. R. Bowman today show that this is an increase of 747 over last year. There were increases in 16 districts this year while 11 found their school age population had dropped. Smaller totals were counted at Phoenix, Sams Valley, Talent, Derby, Applegate, Elk-Trail, Wagner Creek, Oak Grove, Butte Falls, Pinehurst and Colesburg.

The school population in the Ashland district, as of October 25, was 2,411. State basic school support money is allocated to the districts on the basis of their census figures, together with number of attendance days, number of teachers and other factors.

Uniform Quota Over Half Filled

The band uniform fund drive for the senior high school has reached \$450 of its \$800 goal.

Roland Parks, high school principal, said that contributors had been the Elks, Rotary, Junior Chamber of Commerce, and Mr. and Mrs. J. H. McGee.

Several service clubs, Parks said, have indicated they will donate but have not sent in their contributions yet. "Anyone who wishes to contribute," he said, "may do so by addressing his contribution to the Ashland public schools."
