NAVAL RESERVE TO EXPAND PROGRAM

The annual training duty billets for naval volunteer reservists has been increased to provide two-week instruction for some 30,000 volunteer officers and enlisted personnel during the current fiscal year, according to an announcement received from naval headquarters.

The type of duties being emphasized are afloat, reserve fleet, ship activation teams, mobilization teams, combat information centers, mine warfare, anti-submarine warfare and harbor defense.

Eligibility requirements are subject to the new modification which allows commandants to waive the regular requirements when immediate training is necessary for those men to be called to active duty.

Thus, all volunteer reservists that are interested in training duty, whether they can qualify under the below requirements or not, should apply to their district commanders, specifying dates and types of training duty desired.

After acceptance, an individual must sign an affidavit stating that he would be available for active duty within 30 days after mobilization. The reason for the affidavit is for proper use of current funds in the training program, and does not mean that the individual would be automatically called.

The eligibility rules call for the reservist meeting one of the following circumstances: (1) have a satisfactory attendance record as a member of a drill unit; (2) be carried on personnel war plans for mobilization teams or selective service; (3) when annual training is needed to meet requirements for enlistment advancement or for candidates to the U.S. Naval academy; or (4) if a volunteer reservist, holds a rating critical to the conduct of a cruise.

Airport Costs May Force Port Authority Creation

Financial difficulties reported by Medford's Mayor Diamond L. Flynn for the municipal airport may result in a port authority being established for that airport, he said.

Such a move would call for the assessment of taxes from the area served by the airport. Authorization of such a procedure would rest with approval of citizens of the county and the state legislature.

Mayor Flynn reported that the airport difficulties had resulted from increased wear and tear on the runways because of the larger planes used. Added to this, he said, was the indication by the airlines that they would start using large DC-6 planes after the first of the year. It was noted that the airport has runways built during the last war for much smaller planes.

Veterans Under GI Bill Must Notify VA of Recall

All veterans receiving benefit payments from the Veterans administration, should, upon recall to active duty, notify the VA immediately upon their recall, Shirley Brannock, head of the regional office, advised today.

Benefits involved include the G.I. bill or Public Law 16 substance allowance and compensation for service-incurred disabilities.

A veteran who receives such benefit payment after entering active service must return this payment to the VA and all such amounts received will remain outstanding against the veteran until he returns the payments, Brannock said.

A notification should contain the following information: "C" (claims) number, complete name, address, amount of payment, purpose of payment, and the date of service report.

It is very important that the report be sent to the VA office containing the veteran's records. The local area office is at Sixth and Riverside, Medford.

Drivers Asked to Observe Patrols

Driver observance of school patrols at school crossings can do much to alleviate accident danger to the state's children, according to Secretary of State Earl T. Newbry.

Calling attention to the fact that school patrols control only the children and not motor vehicles, Newbry said that cooperation on the part of drivers is essential to the school safety program. Motorists, he said, should be on the alert for the yellow helmet, Sam Browne belt and yellow flag which warn that school children are crossing the street.

Cooperation and caution on the part of motorists and patrol members are the key features of the hundreds of school patrols in Oregon, Newbry added.
