Her husband, George W. King, preceded her in death, and a son, James A. Cook, died May 5, 1939. She is survived by a son, Bert Cook, Ashland; two sisters, Mrs. F. B. Leona and Mrs. Bert Caudle, both of Lostine, Ore.

Services are being held today, November 30, at 1:30 p.m., in the Litwiller Funeral home. The Rev. W. H. Tillman and the Rebekah lodge will be officiating. Interment will follow in the Mt. View cemetery.

Ashland Youths Attend Episcopal Convention

COUNTY SHORT OF DRAFT ELIGIBLES

After the December draft call, Jackson county's supply of draft eligibles will be virtually exhausted, said Guy Applewhite, selective service chairman.

With only about 180 men on the list, January's quota would be impossible to fulfill. Since it is up to congress to decide which group to take next, Applewhite said, some possibilities include 18-year-olds; married men without children from 19 to 26; and the single men without previous service in the 26 to 30 group.

REDUCED UNEMPLOYMENT TAX RATE DUE JAN. 1

In 1951, the 3 per cent rate will go on 20 per cent of all firms covered by the unemployment law in the state, reports the state unemployment compensation commission.

This rate is the lowest tax rate given. This year the reduction from such a provision amounted to 10 million dollars. With 13.6 per cent more firms getting this reduction next year, the commission expects a slightly greater reduction for next year.

Need Outlined for Juvenile Facility

The need for proper detention facilities as a part of the county juvenile rehabilitation program was outlined by Frank Sawacki, Jackson county juvenile officer, who spoke at the weekly meeting of the Ashland Chamber of Commerce Tuesday noon.

At the present time the county jail is the only facility available for detention of juveniles and about 100 youngsters are detained there each year, in spite of the bad psychological effects and the fact that use of the jail is prohibited by state law, he explained.

Sawacki traced the history of juvenile law, which was originally drawn up in this country 50 years ago. Jackson county has had a juvenile department for 10 years. Cases of dependency and parental neglect, as well as delinquency, are handled by the office.

"The county now has a critical need for detention facilities for children," Sawacki declared. He said that over 30 per cent of the youngsters between 14 and 18 that are detained in the jail are kept there longer than a week while their cases are handled by the court. This is usually the most critical period in the life of the youngsters and the time when spiritual and educational guidance is most important. Jailing does more damage at the very time when help is needed most, the juvenile officer said.

Sawacki also asked for assistance from citizens of the county in helping with the rehabilitation program of his office. Greatest needs, he said, are jobs for boys and "work homes" for girls.

Medics to Study Defense Problems

The state's civil defense program continues in high gear with the meeting this Sunday, December 3, of the Institute on the Medical Aspects of Civil Defense in Portland.

The program is mutually sponsored by the Oregon State Medical society, Oregon State Board of Health, and the Medical department of the Oregon State Civil Defense agency. Its program reads, "A short course for physicians dealing with the medical problems among the civilian population resulting from modern warfare and principles, organization methods, and procedures involved in meeting these problems."

A highlight of the Institute will be U.S. Army films in three parts, all under the general title, "Medical effects of the Atomic Bomb." The first part deals with the physical destruction of the bomb. The second is entitled "Pathology and the Clinical Problem." While the third part illustrates "Medical service in Atomic Disaster." Appropriate talks will intersperse the film showings.

General civil defense speeches will be given on civil defense planning and the demonstration of scientific instruments.

Clarence V. Shaver, 46, of 11 B street, Ashland, was one of three men secretly indicted by the county grand jury in October and arraigned in circuit court Monday.

Shaver was arrested by Ashland city police August 8 on charges of contributing to the delinquency of a minor girl six years old. He waived preliminary hearing in justice court and has been free on \$2,000 bond. District Attorney George Nielson said the charged man had been ordered to enter a plea in court Thursday morning.

SEPTIC TANK CLEANERS DECLARED INEFFECTIVE

Septic tank owners should beware of tank bacteria starters and cleaners, M. G. Huber, agricultural engineer, advises.

Huber, on the Oregon State College extension staff, says that cleaners have no particular value in removing the major septic tank trouble, sludge and scum. Also, Huber advised a regular cleaning of septic tanks. Scum and sledge should be removed every four or five years.

U.S. Public Health studies indicate that the addition of yeast and similar compounds have little value in septic tank operation and maintenance.

Even Small School Student Body Fund Now Big Business

Talent High's student body fund is rated at \$1,300 after current expenses are deducted, according to its high school paper, the Hi-Life.

The paper said that it cost almost \$5,000 last year to run the student body. Athletics took one of the biggest chunks of this sum, amounting to \$2,900. Along with this, \$350-plus was spent on drill team equipment last year.

The rest of the money was spent on the school annual, paper, and junior-senior banquet.
