### Talent Reports 25 Chicken Pox Cases

The number of communicable disease cases reported in Jackson county took a sharp upward swing last week with a total of 43 cases reported up to December 1, according to Dr. A. E. Merkel, public health physician.

Leading the list were 25 cases of chicken pox reported from Talent. Two cases of chicken pox were also reported from Ashland and Shady Cove and one each from Medford, Phoenix and Central Point.

Talent also had two cases of infectious hepatitis.

Other disease cases reported were: strep throat, Medford, one; mumps, Medford, two; Butte Falls, one; scarlet fever, Medford, one; influenza, Medford, three, Rogue River, one.

### Hartley Benched With Knee Injury

A leg injury will keep Rolly Hartly, fast little guard on the Bulldogs hoop squad, out of the lineup for an indefinite period, Coach George Bray announced this week.

Hartly received a knee injury in football this year and reinjured it in a fall on the basketball court. He will be greatly missed on the team as one of the top scorers and fastest men in the county.

George Bray and his bearded "Rover Boys" will meet a green squad of Talent high school hoopsters on the Bulldogs' maple boards Friday, December 15.

The Rover Boys will feature a tall and widely experienced squad with one of the brokenest fast breaks in the sports world today. George Bray will be likely starting center for his squad, with Barney Riggs and Dan Sage dropping in the long ones from the guard spots. Gene Farthing and Royal Hart will fill in as All-Americans in the forward slots.

The only starter on the Bulldog squad with previous steady varsity experience will be Jerry Montgomery, ace forward and rebound artist.

The game is to be played at 8 p.m. the 15th. A large crowd is expected to be in attendance.

### Air Observation Urged by McKay

The southern part of the state will be covered by Oregon's air observation system as soon as possible, Governor Douglas McKay said today.

Gov. McKay based his contention on the present turn of the international situation. He stated that the northern half of the state scored high in recent detection tests. Trial notices of hypothetical air raids were within 30 to 90 seconds of the recommended 2-minute maximum.

Col. P. B. Waterbury, Ashland civilian defense director, has made recent statements disclaiming the effectiveness of air observation on the grounds that air detection of high speed airplanes is impossible today for civilians to carry out. Furthermore, he has said it is extremely difficult to man observation posts continuously.

Col. Waterbury is, at the present time, working on a plan for issuing identification cards, similar to those used in the army. The new card will include a description of the person, his finger prints, blood type, local address in case of an emergency, and identification information.

The local civil defense agency has outlined rules for the citizens to observe. They are:

1. Reduce the fire hazard, eliminate trash and rubbish around the home, and help keep the town clean;
2. Eliminate faulty electric wiring;
3. Have a garden hose of proper length handy to the faucet;
4. Have hand fire extinguishers easily available;
5. Keep the city clean, and set a good example for the children;
6. Put trash, papers, and rubbish in the containers now provided; and
7. Have a first aid kit handy and know how to use it.

All persons are urged to sign up for the Ashland civilian defense corps and participate in first aid classes opening shortly after January 1.
