Dr. Taylor Describes Golden Spike Ceremony

The story of the driving of the golden spike in Ashland, connecting rail lines from Portland and San Francisco, was related for members of the Kiwanis club at their meeting Monday noon by Dr. Arthur S. Taylor, professor of history at Southern Oregon college.

Dr. Taylor described the ceremony, which was held in Ashland on Dec. 17, 1887 and attended by townspeople, dignitaries from Oregon and California and railroad officials.

He also quoted from speeches of the occasion which was destined to make the city an early-day rail center.

Grizzlies Sport Five Hoop Wins

The Ashland high Grizzlies are riding high on a five-game winning streak with no losses this season. So far they have made 232 points to their opponents' 174.

The Grizzlies began their 1950-51 season with Eagle Point. In this opener they started in rather ragged fashion but ended in a breeze with 37 points against the losers' 34. Mulholland of Eagle Point was high for the game with 19 points. Forward Jerry Langer was high for the Ashlandites with 11 counters.

Ashland's breeze almost ran out of wind against the tough Coquille Red Devils. With each club sinking 15 field shots, the difference was made at the violation circle when Ashland made 10 out of 18 attempts and the Red Devils could only nine out of the same number of tries. Quarter scores put Ashland ahead at every period: 11 to 12, 21 to 17, and 31 to 25.

In the next contest the Bears showed good defensive play by taking the Eagle Point five again. The Eagles couldn't score a field goal the first half and ended the second period trailing by the score of 24 to 3. Although they hit for 20 the second half, they lost 38 to 23.

Mulholland, who was high scorer in the first game, was held to six by the tight basket-pinchers from Ashland. His teammate, Cattameh, hit for seven to take team honors. Grizzly center Dick Smith led the victors with 11 points.

The fourth game found the boys from Ashland using a height advantage to take the Vernonia Loggers 42 to 27. Big Jerry Langer scored 17 points to lead the victors. Crowston was high for the losers with nine markers.

In the last contest the Grizzlies had their toughest test of the season when they faced the highly-touted Scappoose Indians, last year's district 14 champs.

In this nip-and-tuck battle the Indians managed to lead in the first quarter 18 to 11. Ashland roared back to lead at halftime 31 to 26. When the final buzzer sounded the Grizzlies had outscored the Indians 55 to 51. George Hinkhouse of the Indian squad pivoted from his forward position for 23 points to lead all scorers. Dick Smith countered for Ashland to lead his teammates with 17.

With 17 more games to go, the Ashland hoopsters will play Myrtle Point next on Friday, December 22, at Myrtle Point. The next home game will be December 29 with the same team.

PARKING LIGHTS IN FOG PROVE FATAL

Drivers Beware! Use of parking lights for foggy driving resulted in death during the month of November.

The fatality, reported by Capt. Walter Lansing, head of the state's traffic safety division resulted when a car which was passing another vehicle crashed head-on into an oncoming car which was using only its parking lights in the fog. According to Lansing, the driver of the passing car could only see the oncoming vehicle when it was directly in front of him.

"This is just one example," Lansing said, "of what driving with parking lights can lead to. Other motorists cannot see you until they are almost upon you, and further, you cannot see the highway clearly."

VANDALS DESTROY WINDOWS, LIGHTS

A rampage of vandalism which started early last Friday morning and resulted in smashed windows and street lights, will bring the maximum penalty to those responsible, according to Police Chief Vern Smith.

Smith reported that 15 windows were broken in Lithia park rest rooms, eight windows broken in the city warehouse, two street lights destroyed, the windshield of the city street cleaner smashed and windows broken in the Christian Scientist church. Damage at the church was estimated at \$35.

All damage was caused by rock-throwing, Smith said.

County Farmers Select PMA Committee Members

A three-man committee has been selected by Jackson county farmers to formulate and administer the federal agricultural program during 1951.

David Lowry, Phoenix; Glenn Smith, Jacksonville, and George Loftin, Sams Valley, were named to represent county farmers participating in the production and marketing administration program.

The committee will draw up acreage allotments, marketing and crop quotas and determine price supports for the county.
