Exam's Open for Camp White Jobs

Civil service examinations for 14 occupations at the Camp White Domiciliary center were announced this week by the U.S. Civil Service commission.

Sam Butturf, personnel officer at the domiciliary said the examinations would establish an eligible list from which future vacancies at the hospital will be filled. The positions include recreational technician, kitchen helper, hospital attendant, laborer (custodial), cook, baker, meat cutter, carpenter, painter, stationary boiler fireman, hoisting machine operator, and orthopedic technician (shoe modifier).

Applicants must be between the ages of 18 and 62 and will be graded on the basis of their experience and training. No written tests will be required. Age limits may be waived for veterans.

Scarlet Fever Cases Increase

The number of scarlet fever cases in Jackson county jumped to 23 last week, according to Dr. A. E. Merkle, public health officer. Six of the cases were reported in Talent, one in Ashland, seven in Medford, five in Central Point, one in Phoenix and three in Jacksonville.

Thirteen scarlet fever cases were reported the previous week.

A total of 44 communicable disease cases were recorded by the county health office during the past week. The list includes measles, two cases; mumps, two; influenza, one; whooping cough, one; infectious mononucleosis, one; strep throat, five; pneumonia, two; typhoid fever, one, and chicken pox, six.

Two of the chicken pox cases were reported from Ashland.
