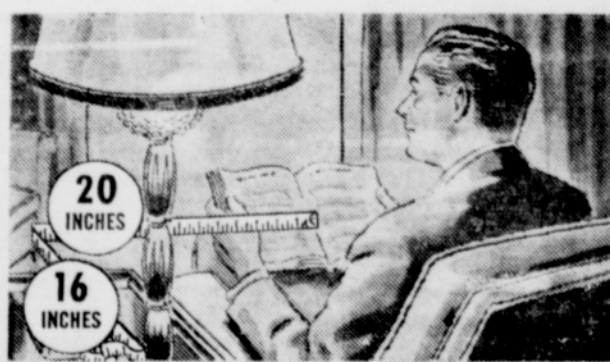

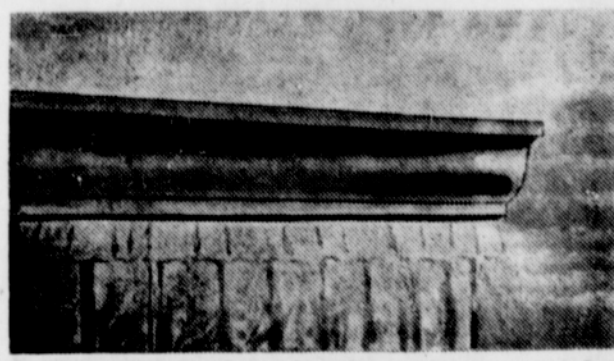

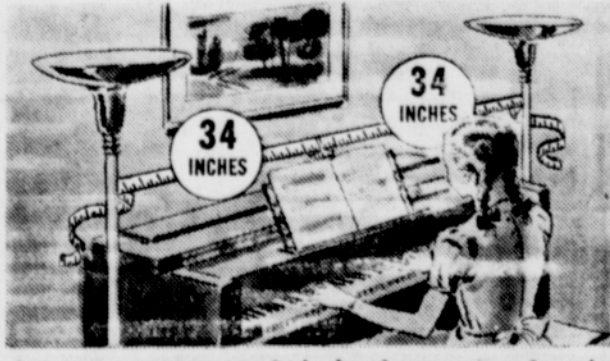
1. DESK WORK is easier when the light is right. The recipe shown—one of several ways to light a desk—uses two wall lamps with 100-watt bulbs.
