Early Day Buffalo, Grizzly Tales

The American government bought several head after the Canadian government had bought 750 head from Pabalo. Then the American government set aside this 6-mile square park for the buffalo's use.

In the early days, these buffalo were started from a very small herd of three; two cows and a bull. They were captured east of the Rocky Mountains when they were calves, and brought across the mountains by Pabalo's father in the 1860's, and kept there in captivity while young.

After the little herd continued to grow, they were taken to the reservation from the Bitter Root valley where the government surveyed the reservation for the Flathead Indians' home. Pabalo (as I recollect) was part Nez Perce or Flathead—I wouldn't be positive. Anyhow, he married a Flathead squaw which brought him into a considerable lot of reservation property.

In time, by his children, and besides what he bought, which was several thousand acres, his herd grew from three buffalo calves to the amount of several hundred head of buffalo, up till the time he sold a part of them to the Canadian government. I knew him to be a fine old man several years ago.

Buffalo 'Curiosity' Buffalo are a curiosity today to the American people. And they become even more so as they are seen in open captivity, where they were at one time the great monarchs of the wild open prairies, long before the white man knew what they were.

They were the beef cattle of the Indian days and survived in great droves out away from the mountains and forests. Here the Indian savages lived in the same way. It was the only real meat the Indians had to thrive on except the antelope and elk.

The silver tip and the grizzly were the king beasts throughout the mountains in those old days as the buffalo was on the plains. After the horse came into play, these kings of the plains were hunted more successfully by the Indians.

Horse Safer The horse was more secure from danger when the grizzlies were attacked by the Indians. The silver tip and the grizzlies were not troublesome animals if they were let alone in their haunts. They simply were an animal that likes to be let alone. But they give no ground if they are molested or attacked by man or beast. They live on mice, wood beetles, grubs and under roots.

Did you ever see a grizzly look straight at you and notice how close together his eyes look to you? And the longer you look at them, they seem like they have got yours tied in a knot, and you feel like everything from your collarbone down to your feet has broken loose (I have).

Did you ever let a grizzly get his arms around you, or feel his breath on your cheek? (No, I didn't, but I was running so slow I could feel his breath on my neck—believe it or not!)

Living in this category of bear stories, through these times

and ages back, you can hear most anything about the most exciting things when you get into a conversation with some of the old sourdoughs and old timers in the northwest.

Old Timers Interesting Some of these old timers can spin yarns that would reach around a whole city.

And likewise showing a good sense of humor one tells this true story. His name was Mathews C. Dunnam. His friends called him Mat for short. He was a mountain ranger and in the Indian days he was an Indian scout for the U.S. government at the time of the Indian uprisings in the early days of the northwest.

He smoked an old Indian pipe of peace that an Indian chief made him a present of, and at times took a little nip of some good old barleycorn when he felt like it. He lived in a country village called Ovando, in Montana, in the upper country of the big Blackfoot, named after the Blackfoot tribe of Indians in the Lewis and Clark days.

His dress was typical of the old days with buckskins, and a fur cap with a raccoon tail hanging to the cap. He wore a heavy mustache and a long white beard. His eyes were as keen as an eagle's and his pose was as straight as an arrow. He loved the freedom of life in nature's beauty.

In his younger life and up to the age of 81 years, he was a guide for hunting parties in the full hunting season. His hunting excursions averaged from two to four parties every fall and he guaranteed them game if they came to hunt.

The game country was far into the Rocky mountains for bear, elk, mountain goat, mountain sheep and deer. He followed a trail which was some 80 miles to the hunting grounds. There were five relays of cabins on the trail, and many miles between camps to stay over night.
