Origin of Southern Oregon Mining

In the early days after the Indian was subdued and made to take his place on the reservation which the government had allotted for him to keep the peace, and his blood-curdling war-hoops were ended, the settlers were able to live without fear.

The settler thrived and lived in his little cabin with all the pleasures of a city home. We have often heard the old story, "A friend within, welcomes a friend without." So the old pioneer very seldom locked his cabin door. He believed in peace on earth and good will to men, in the Rogue river valley.

The old pioneer strived to get along with what he had, to do the work in his fields—knuckling down to hard work, and doing his part to make the Rogue river valley a better place to live in.

As I look back on the days of old, I see the old grandfather clock standing in the corner of the room, and the old spinning wheel standing near the fireplace and grandmother stepping back and forth with her left arm outstretched and her right hand turning the old spinning wheel that in turn turned the spindle to spin the yarn from the carded wool, and I hear the old songs she hummed and sang in unison with the hum of the spindle.

Memories Pondered

It would make your heart ache if those old songs could have been recorded for the fu-

ture which is today. Remember the old cobbler as he pegged his shoes—the harness maker as he drew his waxed thread through the trace of his harness—the farmer plowing his ground with aching feet, while the pioneer mother took care of her family and baked her bread on the hearth of the old fireplace?

These fond memories will always be kept and preserved in our Jackson county museum in Jacksonville, Ore., and the builders of the empire of long, long ago, will never be forgotten.

Markers Exist

Some of the old markings that were built by the pioneers' weather-beaten hands are still in existence.

As day by day the years roll by, you can find and see how they left their brands of work molded in the structures of the early days.

Another real proof we have of yesterday is to hear some old pioneer that has seen and had the experience of their life crossing the plains in the early days.

Courageous Pioneers

We can only imagine by his stories of hardships crossing the treacherous rivers that he had to ford, swim or drown in the courage it took to follow the wagon leader's cry, "Westward Ho!" It was a battlefield where surrender was never known. Oftentimes as I sit and listen to their fascinating stories of years gone by, and see the determination on their old wrinkled faces, it makes me think of the seemingly impossible things a human being can do when he really tries and how great a benefit he performed for his country.

During 1848-68, the old miners tell of some dazzling and blood-curdling stories about the mining days here in Jackson county and some of the mining claims elsewhere in the Rogue river valley. For instance, I will mention some of these early tales of the placers and hard rock mines in the Oregon mining fields.

First Gold Panned

The first color of gold to glow on the bottom of a pan was at the headwaters of the Illinois river near the old landmark called Waldo where a handful of mutinied sailors came across from the Pacific, near Bandon. I presume this is how Bandon inherited its name, when these sailors abandoned their ship somewhere between where Crescent City and Bandon is today.

Waldo was the capital center of the mining fields for a period of time, till Jacksonville took the lead and was a center hub to the mining industry for a good many years. The latter was, at that time, the county seat of Jackson county and gold dust seemed to be everywhere in its vicinity.

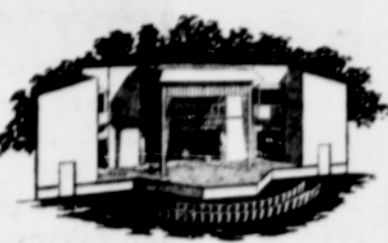
Ordered to active duty last July, the squadron received a refresher and training program at the Naval Air station, San Diego, Cal., before being rushed to the Korean area.
