Local Drive to Aid Korean Relief Plan

Ashland's Kiwanis club made plans Monday to actively participate in the local drive to collect clothing for Korean refugee relief.

The local campaign, originated by members of the Soroptimist club, is being conducted in cooperation with the nationwide American Relief for Korea program.

Action by the Kiwanis club followed a talk by Mrs. Homer Billings at the group's luncheon meeting at the Elks club Monday.

Mrs. Billings, who lived in the capital city of Seoul for 20 years, described the unbelievable living conditions forced upon the Korean civilians by the war.

"Ten million Korean people are now homeless and have nothing but the few inadequate clothes on their backs," she said. More refugees are moving to the southern part of the country, creating increasing problems for relief agencies because of the lack of clothing and housing.

She said missionaries and UN

soldiers are sharing with the displaced persons and are carrying on educational work as best they can.

The complete lack of warm clothing took a terrific toll of civilian lives last winter and ARK agencies hope to avoid the same situation this winter. "The clothing will be distributed by missionaries and we know that it will be placed with the people who are in the most need," Mrs. Billings told the group.

Ashland's collection centers for the old clothing have been established at the city library, fire station and all city churches.

Cliff Harter was named chairman of a committee to determine the club's activity in the local drive. He will be assisted by Marie Peters and Abe Neslin.

Dr. John Schulz, Kiwanis president, was in charge of Monday's meeting. Guest of the club was Dr. Seymour Fowler Jr., newly appointed biology instructor at Southern Oregon college. Leonard Stackline, Medford Kiwanian, was also a guest.

C of C Members 'Dine Out,' Meet Ball Team, Faculty

Members of the Ashland Chamber of Commerce were guests Tuesday of Southern Oregon college when the group's weekly meeting was held in the dining room of Susan Homes hall.

Coach Bill Abby introduced members of the football team and commented on the abilities and experience of each. Abby described the team as "inexperienced and untested," but with an unusual spirit and determination.

Dr. Elmo N. Stevenson, SOC president, introduced members of the faculty, which will number 55 members this year. He termed the faculty as "unusual" in that 15 per cent of the group hold their doctorate while a similar number are close to receiving this degree.

Dr. Stevenson also described the economic and cultural value of the college to the community. He predicted that by 1960 the college will have an enrollment of from 1600 to 2000 students and expressed hope that by that time a proposed million dollar building program will be completed.

The next addition to the campus will be a dormitory building financed solely by the college itself without aid from

Jackson county heads for the Oregon drive of the Crusade for Freedom have been announced by Herb Grey, Medford, regional chairman.

Co-chairmen are Jimmy Dunlevy, manager of radio station KYJC, and H. H. Huggins, Medford manager of the General Petroleum company.

Schools Used
Mrs. George Rode, Medford, is women's chairman of the drive and will be in charge of passing information through the county schools.

The campaign to obtain signatures in support of the program and to raise money for its operation, centers around broadcasts from Radio Free Europe

to the enslaved peoples of the continent.

Radio Free Europe is continually stepping up its barrage against Communist lies, because, in the words of General Lucius D. Clay, national chairman of the Crusade for Freedom, "if we can win the battle for men's minds, there is a good chance we can prevent the cold war in Europe from becoming a hot war."

Powerful Transmitter

The Radio Free Europe transmitter in Munich, western Germany, built with the \$1,317,000 contributed by Americans during the Crusade for Freedom last fall, is the most powerful station on the continent. It is al-

most three times more powerful than the largest United States station.

Its 135,000 watts compare with the 50,000 watt power of the strongest stations in America. In addition, by using a directional antenna, the Munich station's broadcast power is increased to the equivalent of 700,000 watts.

The Munich station concentrates its broadcasts on Czechoslovakia in direct competition with the Kremlin controlled Radio Prague and Radio Bratislava. Munich is on the air 11½ hours every day.

The purpose of the visit, according to members of the committee, is to find out what steps can be taken in such an endeavor and to profit by Redmond's mistakes and successes.

The Ashland hospital committee has already purchased an option on a site located by the drawing elsewhere on this page and is currently studying the methods of financing such an endeavor.

An architect is also being sought who will draw the plans for the new building with the specifications desired by the committee and interested medical staff.

Top herds and their results are Ted Rein with 12 cows averaging 950 pounds of milk and 50.8 pounds of butterfat; W. D. Mongold, 24 cows, three dry, 839 pounds of milk and 43.2 pounds of butterfat.

Ned Cahail, 30 cows, 982 average pounds of milk and 42.5 pounds of butterfat; Cliff Moore, 12 cows, one dry, 793 average pounds of milk and 41.3 pounds of butterfat and Jack Caldwell, 77 cows, three dry, averaging 857 pounds of milk and 39.8 pounds of butterfat.

The 10 top cows were owned by Burle Burreson, R. L. Wyant, W. D. Mongold (two), Lewis Clark (two), Ted Rein, Jack Caldwell, Paul Stevenson and Ned Cahail.

Top milk producer was Caldwell's "Georgie" with 1,612 pounds of milk in August. Burreson's "Judy" was leader in butterfat production with 84.5 pounds for the month.

Calif. Pair Held On Check Charge

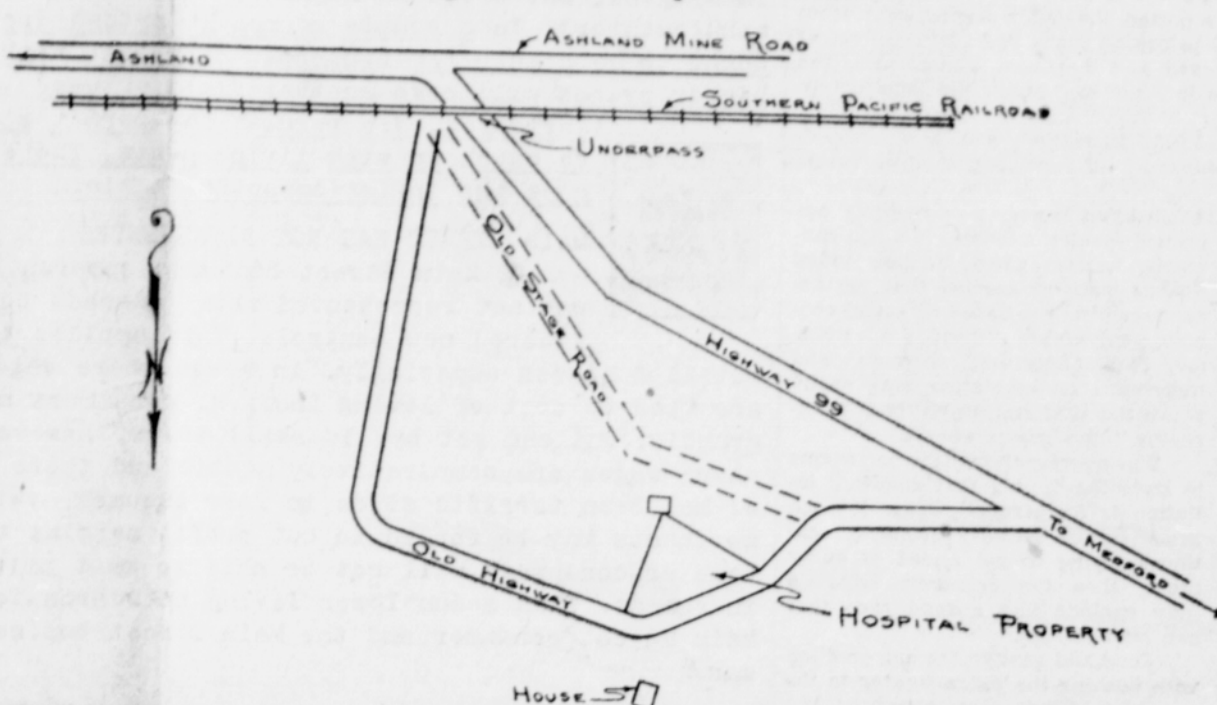

The orientation program for freshmen and new students has been announced by Dr. John Schulz, chairman of guidance. Freshman students will arrive to begin the Freshman Days program at 8 Thursday morning program at 9 a.m. Thursday, September 20, for the first Discussions Offered.

In addition to the usual psychological examinations and library orientation, opportunity for group discussions with faculty and upperclass students as well as individual conferences with faculty advisers are planned for the ensuing Friday, Saturday and Sunday.

Don Lane, manager of the Jackson county Chamber group at Medford, was their representative and Eric Allen, Jr., represented the Medford Mail Tribune.

Ashland School Numbers Higher

Enrollments for Ashland school district No. 5 are now complete, according to Supt. Leand P. Linn's office.

The biggest increase comes in the four elementary schools with 1,061 students, an increase of 85 over 1950-51 which had 976.

Although there will be some shifting this week to take the burden off overcrowded Walker school by changing some of the bus-riding students, the school enrollments are as follows: Briscoe, 385; Lincoln, 388; Walker, 193 and Bellview, 95.

Second in numbers, was the Ashland Junior high school which went up 68 over 1950-51 to a present number of 459. Last year the Junior high had 391 enrolled.

The Senior high school totalled 313, a 17 increase over last year's 296.

The district's enrollment by grade included the following: first, 185; second, 185; third, 200; fourth, 179; fifth, 156; sixth, 156; seventh, 164; eighth, 147; ninth, 148; 10th, 134; 11th, 112 and 12th, 67.
