

School Board Hears Reading Program Plan

The special education program for the Ashland school district was discussed at the meeting of the board last Monday.

Mrs. Frances Klein, who is to direct the program this year, met with the board and said that the main emphasis is to be on reading, although she will also work with students having speech difficulties.

The program was discussed last week as part of the three day series of meetings when the reading program was under consideration. It was pointed out last Monday that there will be more meetings of those teachers in the reading field.

Tests Planned

Achievement tests are to be given in October to determine the reading level of the students.

The board also reviewed the offerings at the high school and studied enrollment figures in all grades.

The new art teacher recently elected is Phil Lindley. His undergraduate work was done at Idaho State college and last year he attended the University of Oregon. Lindley served in the army and was in the Pacific theater of World War II. The Lindleys are living on Granite street and will have a son at the Briscoe school.

OPS HEAD WILL MAKE PORTLAND VISIT

Michael V. DiSalle, director of price stabilization, Washington, D.C., will be a Portland visitor Thursday, September 20, according to word received Monday morning by Carl C. Donough, director of the Portland district OPS office.

DiSalle plans a Pacific coast trip to have a first-hand look at OPS field operations.

He will arrive in Seattle Wednesday night, September 19, by plane, and leave for Portland Thursday afternoon.

Portland Dinner Set
Donough said DiSalle's short time in Portland will be used to best advantage. Plans for a dinner at which the price stabilization director will be asked to speak are set for September 20, 7 p.m., at the Multnomah hotel, Donough said.

A special press and radio conference will be held if time permits. DiSalle will leave Portland Friday morning, September 21.

"Toledo Plan" Author
DiSalle was named to his post by President Truman in December, 1950. He was mayor of Toledo, Ohio, from 1948-1950, and first came to public attention as author of the "Toledo Plan" which greatly reduced industrial strikes in that area. Born in New York, DiSalle began law practice in Toledo in 1932. In 1937, he served in the Ohio state legislature. He has been referred to as a

Communist collaborators and informers, giving names, places and addresses. There also are programs on health, labor, agriculture, drama and even a "soap opera" written by a Czech woman now living in the United States. The program emphasizes the advantages of freedom enjoyed by the western world. Music programs include a disc jockey show and recordings of concerts played by famous orchestras.

On another program, "How to Read Your Newspaper," RFE commentators call attention to a specific story in the controlled press of Czechoslovakia. Then they point out what newspapers and radio stations in the free world reported on the same subject.

From Radio Free Europe's Frankfurt station, short wave broadcasts are beamed to Poland, Bulgaria, Hungary, Rumania and Albania, as well as to Czechoslovakia.

Radio Asia Planned

General Clay reports that at least two more powerful transmitters of the Munich type are much needed to expand the sphere of RFE's influence, and that a new Radio Free Asia is planned to penetrate the Iron Curtain in the Far East.

To make the new stations possible, the 1951 Crusade for Freedom has set a goal of \$3,500,000 in voluntary contributions and the participation of 25 million Americans during the national campaign to be conducted throughout the month of September.

Oregon Quota

Oregon's quota for the campaign has been set at \$40,000 and 130,000 citizen enrollments through a state-wide organization with Tom Lawson McCall, Gov. Douglas McKay's executive assistant, as general chairman. Gov. McKay is honorary chairman.

"Because it is supported by individual American citizens," says Gov. McKay, "Radio Free Europe is not hampered by restrictions. It is a tough, slugging weapon in the struggle for freedom. The Crusade is deserving of the support of all Oregonians to the limit of their endeavors."

OLD TIMERS

Rogue River Indian Wars

"Then I used a few English words, not likely to be understood by the Indian interpreter, such as 'disperse' and 'segregate.' In fact, we kept so close to the savages and separated from one another so that any general firing would have been nearly as fatal to the Indians as to the whites.

"While I admitted that I thought that my time had come, and hurriedly thought of my wife and children, I noticed nothing but coolness among my companions. Gen. Lane sat down on a log with his arm banded in a sling, the lines about his mouth rigidly compressing his lips, while his eyes flashed fire. He asked brief questions, and gave me sentences answers to what little the Indians said to us.

"Capt. A. J. Smith, who was prematurely gray haired, and was afflicted with a nervous snapping of the eyes, leaned upon his cavalry saber and looked anxiously down upon his well formed line of dragoons in the valley below. His eyes snapped more vigorously than usual, and muttered words escaped from under the old dragon's mustache that did not sound like prayers.

"His squadron looked very beautiful, but alas, they could render us no assistance. I sat down on a log close to the old Chief Jo, and having a sharp sheath knife under my hunting shirt, I kept one hand near its handle, determined that there would be one Indian to make 'good' about time the firing commenced.

Lane Dampens Tempers

"In a few moments, Gen. Lane said, 'Owens, who has violated the armistice, and who has killed Jim Taylor, is a treacherous bad man. He is not one of my company soldiers. When I catch him he shall be punished. I promised in good faith to come into your camp with 10 other unarmed men to secure peace. Myself and men are placed in your power; I do not believe that you are such cowardly dogs, as to take advantage of our unarmed men's condition. I know that you have the power to murder us, and you can do it as quickly as you please but what good will our blood do you? Our murder will exasperate our friends, and your tribes will be hunted from the face of the earth.

"Let us now proceed with the treaty, and in place of war let's have lasting peace.' More was said in this strain by the general, and the excitement gradually subsided, after Gen. Lane promised to give a fair compensation for the defunct Jim Taylor in shirts and blankets.

Two Years Peace

"The treaty of the 10th of September, 1853, was completed and signed and peace restored for only two years, from 1853 to 1855. After the treaty was signed on the east slope of Table Rock, our party descended down the slope over the rocks and boulders, through the

buck brush down to where our horses were tied at the foot of the mountain below, and there we mounted at the sound of the bugle.

"Old A. J. Smith galloped up to his squadron and gave a brief order. The bugle sounded again and they all wheeled and headed for camp. As Gen. Lane and the party rode back across the valley, we looked up and saw the rays of the setting sun gilding its precious hues of color on the fringe and outline of that famous old Table Rock.

'Luck Better'

"I drew a long breath and remarked to the old general, the next time he wanted to go unarmed into a hostile camp, he would have to hunt for some one else besides myself, to act as an interpreter. The old general responded with a brilliant smile, he said 'God bless you; luck is better than science.'

Old Chief John and Adam, and all the others except Jo's and Sam's people, fought hard; but the Rogues proper never forgot the impression we made on them in the last great council of Sept. 10, 1853. It was a grand and successful council (the Rogues Indians fought us no more; and they did not forget their promises to us).

From the shelf of that old Table Rock mountain, peace was achieved and won for all times, carved into the monuments of granite and written in that great book (Oregon's History) as the battle of Table Rock.

Fulham spoke for the Ashland delegation and stressed the fact that "substitution of bus service, as proposed by the railroad, would not be adequate for passengers, mail and express from a standpoint of public convenience and necessity."

Fulham attacked the equipment used by the SP as "obsolete" and offered the example of the Budd car as a solution to the money-losing problem.

He pointed out that there is "no through train service" and that "the Shasta line is only as strong as its weakest link."

The local manager cited figures of population growths along the Siskiyou line and the examples of promotion of this line by the SP. The three main types of public conveyance were outlined by Fulham, i.e., bus, airplane, and train, and their place in the citizen's life.

SP's Arguments
In an interview this morning, Fulham said that the SP's arguments centered around the shifting of passenger service losses onto the shippers in higher freight rates and that a stoppage of this loss would "lessen the burden on the shippers."

He also said that SP officials were only asking for a discontinuance of service from Dunsuir to the state line which would virtually mean to Grants Pass.

He added that the railroad officials proposed to put the passengers who would wish Dunsuir train connections on the Greyhound or Trailways busses and carry the baggage and express via PMT (Pacific Motor Transport), if discontinuance is granted.

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PASTOR DIES

Dr. Borden's Services Held

Funeral services for the late Dr. E. P. Borden were conducted Tuesday morning in the Ashland Congregational church.

The Rev. Paul A. Davies, Portland, superintendent of the Congregational churches of Oregon, officiated with the Liturgical Funeral home in charge of the arrangements.

Died in Wyoming

Dr. Borden was born in 1881 at Wilkes-Barre, Pa., and passed away at Rock Springs, Wyo., on September 6. He was on a visit with Mrs. Borden at the home of their son, Russell and family.

The deceased had graduated from Temple University in Philadelphia in 1907, and held pastorates in Oxford, Pa., Manderson, Wyo., and in Oregon at La Grande, Hermiston, Portland, Oregon City and Ashland.

Practiced Dentistry

In 1916, he graduated from North Pacific college of Dentistry in Portland and practiced dentistry in Portland and Oregon City. He served the Oregon City Congregational church for 16 years before coming to Ashland as pastor 5½ years ago.

He was a past master and life member of Doric Lodge, No. 132, A.F. and A.M., Portland, and Parkrose chapter, O.E.S., No. 151, of Portland. He was an honorary member of the Ashland Kiwanis club.

Survivors Listed

He is survived by his wife, Bertha M., of Ashland; daughter, Mrs. Helen Viets, Long Beach, Cal.; sons, Russell C. of Farson, Wyo., and John M. of Oregon City; sister, Mrs. F. W. Kellogg of Tunkhannock, Pa.; brothers, Frank Borden of Washington, D.C., and Granville Borden of Alameda, Cal., and by five grandchildren.

Final services were held at the Siskiyou crematorium in Medford.
