



YOUTHS CAPTURED AFTER WIDESPREAD SEARCH . . . This dramatic photo shows armed police in Arcadia, Calif., closing in on two youths who had been sought in a widespread search after four men had kidnapped and robbed a doctor in order to get his drugs. Rawley Ray Poe, 29, and Robert Nausbaum, 24, are seen at right as they were flushed from a hiding place and taken into custody by officers carrying pistols and tear gas bombs. Two teenagers were later found in hiding in nearby bushes to complete the roundup of suspects in the crime. All prisoners were booked on suspicion of kidnapping and robbery.

In the wild gun battle, he fatally shot three army officers. This battle followed a similar shooting incident in another part of the city. Death toll in the two clashes was six dead on the government side—and two Huks fatally shot. The Huks are aided and abetted by the Communists.

The note contained Red offers to renew armistice talks immediately, but terms could not be accepted.

DOING BUSINESS ON MAIN STREET

President Truman is going ahead to set up a small defense plants administration as provided in national production act, even though congress failed to provide funds for its operation. President will name a new chairman, ask Secretary Sawyer for office in commerce department and then transfer staff and funds under which office of small business in national production authority is now operating. By this means he may circumvent a wishy-washy congress and get much-needed small business organization going and operating until congress again reverses itself and provides money for an agency it created. It will be remembered that this column reported several weeks ago that after Congress had authorized SDPA and \$25,000,000 so it could operate, the house master-minding appropriations committee flouted congress and kicked out the appropriation.

A MAIN STREET FEATURE

FARM BUYING POWER TO INCREASE

Agricultural economists and department of agriculture are predicting pick-up in buying power of farmers in months ahead, which should be of interest to Main Street business firms. On national average, despite drop in farm prices, farmers are about 10 per cent better off insofar as net buying power over their position last year.

Despite larger crops, prices of food at retail level may continue about as present for next few months, due to increased costs in handling and processing. Lowered output of household washing machines, ironers and dryers in early 1952 is forecast by NPA due to cuts in steel allotments; new tailored price regulations is up-coming on farm equipment at retail level; shoe and slipper production of 32 million pairs is 13 per cent under August a year ago; cotton carded sales yarn is at approximately peak output set during World War II while cotton woven fabrics was 7 per cent lower than first quarter of 1951, but 5 per cent above second quarter of 1950 for total of 2,653,000 linear yards.

FARM MORTGAGE DEBT UP 8 PER CENT

Of interest to business firms on Main Street is fact that private debt in 1950 totaled \$245,000,000,000, increases of some \$36,000,000,000. Federal debt remained virtually unchanged; state debt was up 35 per cent.

In rural sections farm mortgage debt continued upward 8 per cent to total of \$5,800,000,000, while farm production loan credit declined 5 per cent to \$6,100,000,000.

Price ceiling violations in southeastern states among lumber dealers has been uncovered and in Georgia \$5,000 in fines have been assessed. Manufacturers, wholesale and retail dealers and sawmill operators all are involved.

VETERANS who will train this fall under the GI bill should plan to have personal funds to cover at least a couple of months, since GI subsistence checks may be late in coming. VA reports. VA is doing everything possible to keep delays to a minimum, even to the extent of suspending, for the time being, those administrative procedures not directly related to the task of getting veterans into training. Despite all efforts, however, some delays will occur this year.

Travel of dependents of armed forces personnel to Japan will be resumed on limited scale early in November for the first time since such travel was suspended in July, 1950, following the outbreak of the Korean conflict. Under this resumed travel program, dependents will sail either from the Seattle or San Francisco.

Competitive examinations for a navy-sponsored college education under the naval reserve officers training corps program will be held throughout the country on December 8, 1951. Applications for the four-year course starting in the fall of 1952 must reach the U.S. navy examining board, Princeton, New Jersey, by November 17, 1951. Application forms are available at high schools, colleges, navy recruiting stations, and naval officer procurement offices. The program is open to male high school seniors and graduates who are citizens between the ages of 17 and 21, and are physically qualified. NROTC units

are located at 52 U.S. colleges and universities.

Q. I am a veteran of World War I. Although I reported the births of my two children, I have had no increase in my compensation. What can I do to get this? W.C.P., Browerville, Minn.

A. You should write to your regional office, including your claim number in your letter, and explain the situation to them. Your percentage of disability, if any, bears upon the question of whether or not you are entitled to additional compensation.

Q. I am a first lieutenant in the United States marine corps. Can you tell me when the next promotion will be from this rank? W.E.B., Lithia Springs, Ga.

A. The marine corps recently said that 496 of its most senior first lieutenants on active duty had been selected for promotion to temporary captain. Upon passing physical examinations and if otherwise qualified as determined by their commanding officers, the new captains will receive their bars. Of the 496, about 60 per cent are reservists on active duty.

Q. I am the wife of a soldier. Can you tell me when, and from what units personnel will be transferred to overseas theatres to replace veterans who have been returning to this country under the army's rotation plan? Mrs. J.E.M., Curtis, Mich.

A. Six thousand soldiers selected for this purpose from units within the United States will arrive at ports of embarkation between November 15 and 25. There will be 609 from the first army, 652 from the second, 1601 from the third, 635 from the 4th, 804 from the 5th, 913 from the 6th, and 776 from technical and administrative.

National Guard Seeks Pilot Trainees

The air national guard is opening an intensive drive for pilot trainees who, according to present plans, will return to air guard squadrons in or near their home towns after completion of pilot training with the USAF. This procurement program is part of the long range reserve plan recently announced by the air force. It will be carried out on a nation-wide basis and will be concentrated in areas where squadrons are or will be located.

Up to 10,000,000 pounds of beef will be purchased from foreign countries as soon as possible to insure an uninterrupted flow of beef to army, navy, and air force personnel overseas who are normally supplied through eastern seaboard points, the army says. Authorization to procure beef from sources outside the United States was given because offerings of beef in this country have failed to meet requirements of the services.

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A Tree Should Be Kept Within Bounds Always

Shade trees require trimming in the summer when they grow out of bounds.

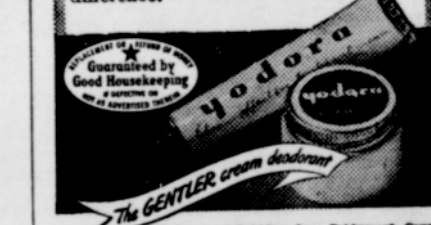
