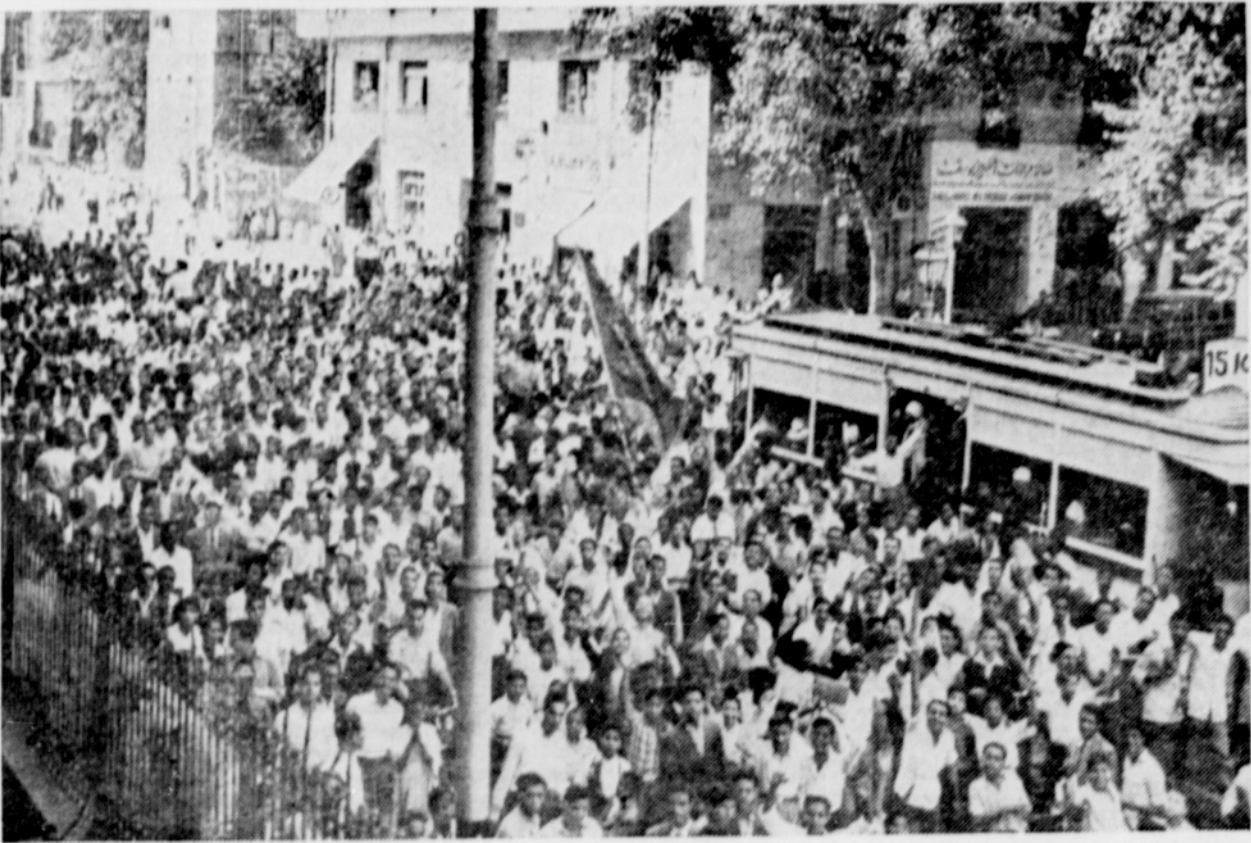
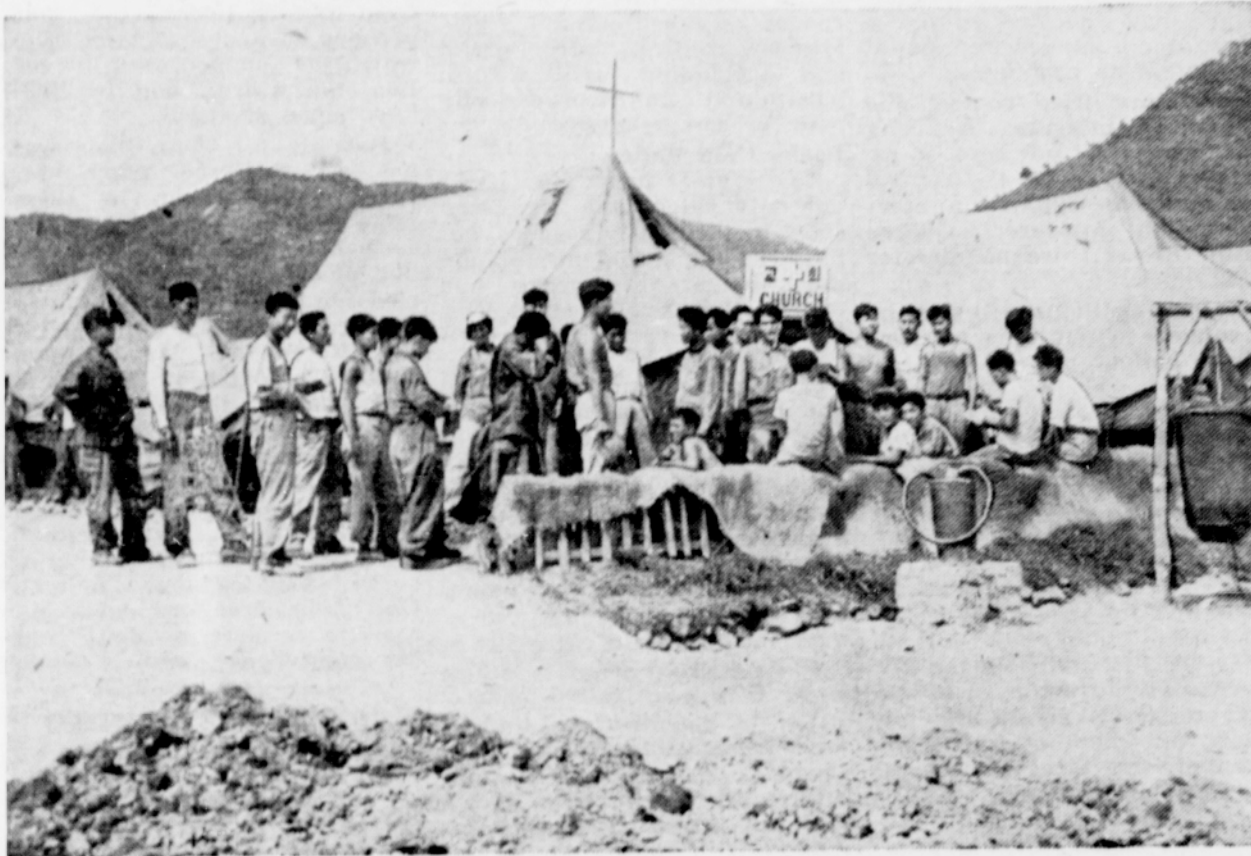




ANTI-BRITISH DEMONSTRATION IN CAIRO . . . This throng of Egyptians is taking part in one of the demonstrations touched off by the demand of Premier Nahas Pasha of Egypt that parliament abrogate the 1936 treaty with Great Britain and take over the Sudan. Parliament acceded to his demand. The crowd shouted for the ouster of British troops from the Suez canal zone and rioted briefly in front of the British embassy. Egypt refused a full partnership in an allied middle east command with Britain, France, Turkey, and the United States. Britain later isolated the Suez canal zone from the rest of Egypt and divided Egypt's army.



KOREAN POWS HOLD SERVICES . . . Chinese and North Communist prisoners of war voluntarily attend a camp religious service conducted by Chaplain Harold Voelkel, a former missionary in Korea (right, with book), in Pusan, Korea. Many of the prisoners, including Christians who had been forced into the Communist armies, have even built their own churches. Christian services, conducted in Korean and Chinese tongues, consist chiefly of morning prayer meetings. Non-Christian POWs are encouraged to hold services in their own rites by the chaplains of the United Nations forces and some have done so.



TOO LATE . . . Medical aid arrives too late to save life of an American soldier of the first cavalry division who lies dead on a stretcher somewhere on the Western Korean war front. Medical corpsmen are attaching the tag to the dead soldier's clothing that reads "killed in action." Identity will be made and a study of how he met his death, and his nearest of kin will be notified. He will be buried either in a military cemetery in Korea or the remains will be sent home.

Farm Topics

Chile Produces Some Of World's Best Wool

Three-Fourths of Crop Is Shipped to U. S.

The small American farmer has learned from experience just how profitable a small flock of sheep can be to his general farm program. And in the western part of the country great flocks are maintained by producers.

One of the greatest producers of wool, now selling at a record price, is Chile. The industry is valued at \$170,000,000 and employs more than 10,000 people.

Chile's first sheep were brought from Spain by the Spanish conqueror Pedro de Valdivia over 400 years ago. In 1877, 300 head were brought to the Punta Arenas area from the Falkland Islands.



The huge English Marsh Romney will produce 12 kilos of long staple wool, or 30 pounds. This type wool is often called the best in the world.

The industry specializes in the famous English Marsh Romney sheep which produces, according to many experts, the finest long staple wool in the world. Today, Chile has a total sheep population close to 7,000,000 head.

Three quarters of the nation's wool crop—about 15,000 metric tons—goes to the United States. England gets the remainder.

Farm Worker Crop Output Triples in Fifty Years

Fifty years ago a farm worker produced enough food for himself and five other persons. Today the crops raised by a single worker are sufficient for 15 persons.

Although machinery has had much to do with this spectacular productivity record, a major factor is the expanded use of fertilizers. The nation's farms last year consumed 18,346,132 tons of soil food—six times as much as in 1901—at a cost of \$744,000,000.

At the turn of the century 265 million acres of crop land, tilled by 13 million farm workers, were needed to supply the crops required by a population of 76 million. Now 10 million workers produce from 345 million acres of land the food required by twice as many Americans, as well as thousands of persons in other countries.

Agricultural authorities say that the use of fertilizer is responsible for roughly one-fourth of the volume of all crops.

The use of fertilizer is expected to continue upward for an indefinite period.

Seed Beds



It is a long time from planting seed beds, but gardeners and farmers might spend some of their spare time during the winter months making one. Seed beds with plastic covers are hailproof, shatter-proof and light in weight. A plastic-coated wire mesh, weighing less than glass, passes on to the plants most of the sun's ultra-violet and infrared rays. This material is available at most farm equipment dealers and hardware stores.

Poultry and Egg Eating Increases, Experts Say

Poultry experts report the American family is consuming more poultry and eggs and predicts the increase will continue during the rest of 1951. Forecasts indicate the average American will have eaten 30 pounds of chicken by the end of 1951, 10 per cent more than last year; 406 eggs, slightly more than in 1950; and about five pounds of turkey meat, approximately the same as last year.

DOING BUSINESS ON MAIN STREET

—A Weekly Newsletter

● As result of analysis of business prospects for next few months, economists are advising private business to start tightening prosperity belt along Main Street because about January there is expected an easing off in prices and sharp tightening of credits. Wise merchant will start getting his house in order, analyzing inventory, getting collections up to date and holding slow-moving items to a minimum.

● This easing off may not come on all lines, but according to indications in retail field position of clothing, including underwear, hosiery, and shoes is weak, and such items in home appliance field as refrigerators, television, washing machines, stoves, sweepers, dishwashers are due for a break both in buying and prices.

COST OF LIVING TO INCREASE

● Cost of living is expected to inch up despite attempts of OPS to hold the line. BUT INCREASES WILL COME OUTSIDE JURISDICTION OF OPS IN RENTS, TELEPHONE, TELEGRAPH, GAS, LIGHTS AND OTHER UTILITIES AND FARM PRODUCE WHICH IS BELOW PARITY. Beef prices are among those seeping through OPS fingers. OPS now says slaughterhouses and packing plants have boosted total law violation to 2,804 in 2,482 plants inspected. However, Chicago report indicates 95 of leading packers in one recent week were only able to buy 65 per cent of cattle they bought in comparable week a year ago although more cattle were brought to market.

● Conclusion: Producers and feeders in small town of country are NOT going bankrupt as result of ceiling prices on hoof, but are selling all grades at "prime" beef prices. GROCERY SALES UP 8 PER CENT

● Department of Commerce reports sales in grocery lines up 8 per cent above previous month, but 9 per cent below a year ago. Cumulative sales for first eight months of 1951 were 5 per cent ahead of last year, due largely to increased prices. The same holds true in dry goods with cumulative sales 5 per cent higher than a year ago.

● While crop estimates this year are of bumper variety there are approximately a million less workers on American farms than 1945-49 average of 12,744,000 and 300,000 less than last year. Department of agriculture reports August farm employment was 11,719,000. Composite wage rate per hour was 62¢ cents as compared to 47¢ cents in 1950.

● Federal reserve board reports farm mortgage debt is on increase despite fact more cash sales are reported than ever before. Reason given is increased land values. Department of agriculture reports dollar volume of farm mortgage during first four months of 1951 was 18 per cent higher than a year ago and higher than any year since records have been kept. However, number of mortgages shows no great increase.

HELPLESS veterans who need the regular care and attendance of another person, and who may be entitled to the increased pension rate of \$120 per month will have to apply by letter to receive it. There will be no automatic review of cases now on the pension rolls to determine whether they qualify for the increase from the present rates of \$60 and \$72 per month.

More than 1,500 handicapped veterans of World War II and the fighting in Korea have been returned to full time civilian jobs since November of 1946. The Army made this announcement in connection with observance of Employ the Physically Handicapped Week.

The Marine Corps now has openings for 1,000 college graduates in its expanded officer program. College graduates between the ages of 20 and 27 are sought to meet the increased requirements for junior officers caused by the expansion of the release of reservists to civilian life.

Q. Can a veteran enter into business with a non-veteran, and get a GI business loan? L.P.B., Darby, Mont.

A. Yes, provided the interest of the veteran is properly protected. The VA guarantee, however, will

be limited to the veteran's portion of the business.

Q. I've been on active duty in the Army for the past 20 years, and I am soon to be discharged. Will I be eligible for GI bill training, or did the July 25 cut-off date affect me? C.M.S., Boulder, Utah.

A. You will be eligible for training, provided you are discharged for other than dishonorable reasons. For the most part, the July 25 cut-off date affected veterans discharged before July 25, 1947. Those discharged afterwards have four years from the discharge date in which to begin, and until July 25, 1956, in which to wind up training, depending on entitlement.

Q. I am in the Army and I have a term NSLI policy. I understand that I may apply for a waiver of my entire premium. Is that right? L.G.V., Mayfield, Mich.

A. That is permitted under the new insurance law enacted by the Congress earlier this year. See your insurance officer for full details.

Q. I am taking a course under the GI bill for which I now find I have no aptitude at all. Can I still change my course and thus use up the remaining two years of my GI Bill entitlement? R.C.L., Crystal, N. Dak.

A. You may change your course if you can prove to the Veterans Administration that the new course would be more in keeping with your aptitude, previous education, training, or other factors. You should apply to the VA office which has your records.

Army Develops Greaseless Rifle Pack

A new greaseless pack for rifles has been standardized by the Army Ordnance Corps and will soon replace the coatings of heavy grease preservative which have been used in the past. The new envelope container can be peeled off in a matter of seconds, leaving the rifle ready for immediate action. Formerly, the task of removing the grease took three hours. Machine guns and other small arms, as well as rifles, may be protected by the new pack.

The Air Force has a new personnel policy designed to ease the burden of separation between husbands and wives serving on active duty with the Air Force. When married couples are serving at different installations either partner may request transfer to the station of his or her spouse. In instances where the request involves transfer to an overseas installation, approval of such a request will be governed by the availability of housing.

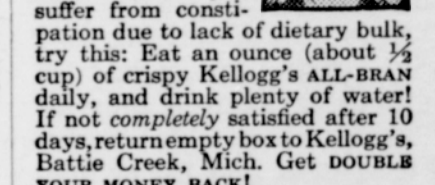
