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Dam Summary...

"... Next spring 50,000 yearling silvers now held at the station will be freed in the Rogue.

"... On hand for release in the Rogue as legal-sized and larger fish next year are 115,000 rainbow trout. During the winter, food consumption amounts to 500 pounds a day for the yearling fish and the summer average is a ton of food a day."

These facts from the Butte Falls hatchery show that there is, and has been, a large restocking program carried on for the Rogue river at considerable expense.

Can Program Work?

Assuming the basin needs irrigation water, flood control, and power, if the expense is justified can the fishery be maintained, and possibly increased, with a program following construction of a high dam?

From Grand Coulee we find the following: "... results obtained to date indicate conclusive success in diverting the upper Columbia fish runs into the accessible lower tributaries."

From Shasta dam we have (as a result of more constant water flow and of cooler temperatures) in the main river beds directly below the dams the following: "Natural spawning in Sacramento river was remarkably successful..." according to a report in the California fish and game bulletin.

Spawning Compensation

Further, in the same report, "... The improvement in river conditions has compensated as nearly as can be determined, at present, for the loss of spawning grounds above Shasta dam."

As for business in this area which is directly connected with the fishery (stores, boat and cabin rentals), the following data is from the federal government's special scientific report evaluating the sports fishery below Shasta dam, to-wit: "The

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number of boat landings on the Upper Sacramento river increased from one in 1946 to 11 in the early part of 1949.

"... The greatest known growth in the number of establishments carrying complete lines of fishing tackle occurred in the Orland-Chico area where the number increased from some three to 21 during the period of 1945 to 1949."

Values Compared

Continuing the theme, "Is it all worth it?", when the Grand Coulee maintenance project was instigated, the annual return from the affected fishery was \$250,000 as opposed to the \$809,000 estimated to be effected by the proposed Rogue dams.

The belief in such projects is expressed in the 1950 report of the development program in the Lower Columbia river area begun in 1949 which "consists of the maximum development and management of the fish runs in tributaries of the lower Columbia river basin. To effectuate this program, approximately a 10-year period and 20 million dollars will be required, of which one million dollars has been appropriated for expenditure in fiscal year 1949."

Belief in Success

This program is substantiated upon the following statement which supports such a huge program as stated above: "Experi-

ence and past studies indicate that the objectives of the lower Columbia River Fishery Development program can be attained."

Thus, it is believed by those who have worked with Columbia and Sacramento river projects that such programs "can be attained" and have shown "remarkable success."

Secretary of the Interior Os-

car Chapman has told local groups that support of plan "A" has been refused by his office because, among others, "... the lack of information as to the effect the proposed program would have on fisheries, mineral resources and recreation in the basin."

In light of the above data, it

would seem that the only question to be answered now is, "Will the money invested be worth it for support of the Rogue fishery?" An answer of "YES" would remove the principal opposition to the plan and pave the way for realization of the irrigation, flood and electrical projects.



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
