Service Trade Checkup Planned

Lon W. Hatch, OPS agent, will be in Ashland shortly to check on service trades under OPS regulations which are delinquent in filing ceiling prices.

Willis A. West, enforcement officer of the Portland district office, has warned that establishments coming under the "service" section of the regulation run the risk of being closed down.

Examples of such trades are laundries, dry-cleaners, bowling alleys, service stations, shoe repairs, electrical repairs (except construction trades), garbage collection, and many others.

Prices for services are based on the highest charged in the period Dec. 19, 1950 to Jan. 25, 1951.

FARMERS' FORECAST

OSC-USDA Weekly Farm Review

Farm prices and costs were tapped out on a high note in 1951, according to the weekly price, cost and weather review prepared by the OSC Extension Service from USDA reports and other data.

PRICES CLIMB: More increases than decreases during the month ending December 15 raised the general farm price level another four points. The end of the year found farm prices 7 per cent above the close of 1950 and only 3 per cent below the February peak. Farm costs hit their high point in November and held at that level for the remainder of the year.

PARITY PRICE CHANGES DUE: But right here might be a good spot to throw out a reminder. Don't be surprised at changes either up or down in effective parity later this month. With the beginning of the New Year, the parity price of commodities carrying a transition may drop another 5 per cent in addition to the 10 per cent already allowed. This was written into the 1949 Agricultural Act to gradually bridge the gap between the old and the new formula. The purpose was to cushion any sharp fall that might result from the changed methods of arriving at parity prices.

PRICE-COST RATIO NARROWS: The spread between prices and costs has narrowed during the past 12 months. In spite of higher prices received, a greater increase in prices paid has cut the exchange value of farm products. Farm products on December 15 would buy less than they did at the close of 1950. The parity ratio of farm products stood at 107 on December 15 — down one point compared with a year earlier.

MANY PRODUCTS STILL BELOW PARITY: Parity is in the limelight again these days—especially in connection with potatoes and wool. Actually, however, many products, with the notable exceptions of potatoes, wool, and most meat animals, were still below parity on December 15. Let's take a quick look behind the scenes and see
