YOUR COUNTY AGENT:

Discusses Pruning During Freeze

This snow and very cold weather have pretty effectively curbed pruning in the orchards.

However, if it should again be sunny like it was recently there may be some temptation to go out and prune, both in order to get the job done and because the ground while it is snow covered would not be muddy.

There isn't much question but what pruning now will cause some injury to the trees. The extent of the injury would depend on a good deal on the type of weather which we have in the immediate future.

Causes Drying Out
Any time that trees are pruned when the wood is actually frozen there will be a drying out from the cut surface, and as a consequence there will be a die-back from the cut. The longer and more intense the cold spell is, the worse the die-back will become. In view of this, it would appear to be best not to do any orchard pruning until you are sure that the wood is no longer frozen.

As for the injury which may actually result from the freezing, that is a question which can only be answered as the season develops. As the ground was covered with snow, it would be

logical to assume that all underground parts of plants, such as gladiola bulbs which may be in the ground, would be protected and would not be hurt. On the other hand, rapid chilling results in more injury than slow chilling.

A new law passed last year by the state legislature has created considerable interest among those who apply sprays in the valley. This is the Agricultural Chemical Control act, and while the law mentions insecticides, fungicides and fertilizers, it actually applies only to those people who apply herbicides.

Herbicides are those materials which we apply to kill weeds and grasses. 2,4-D is probably the most widely used, but all of the others would also be included under the act. This new law provides that anyone who hires out to apply these herbicides must be licensed under the state department of agriculture. The only exception is the aircraft operators. They must be licensed whether they apply herbicides, insecticides, fungicides, fertilizers or other agricultural chemicals.

Prior to the licensing, the state department held a school for these operators at the state college in Corvallis. This school was scheduled for January 28 and 29, with an examination for licensing on January 30.

There are only a few people locally who are affected. Anyone spraying for himself or for others, provided he puts on only insecticides or fungicides, does not need to worry about the law at all.

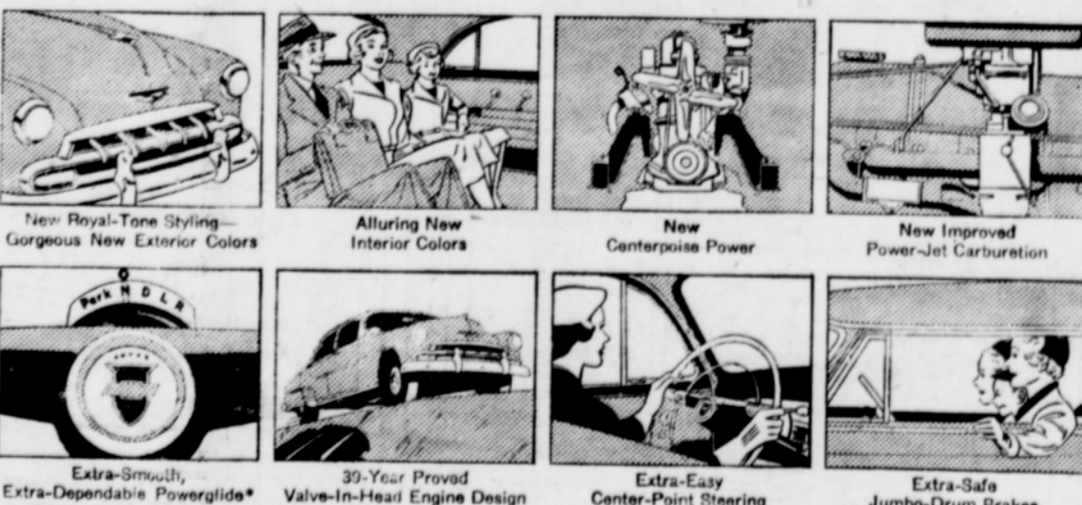
