

SOC Site of Conservation Workshop Offered Specially Selected Teachers

Thirty-six elementary school teachers from every county in Oregon will gather on the Southern Oregon college campus this summer to learn new and more effective methods of presenting the subject of conservation to children of elementary school age.

Southern Oregon college is the first school in the state of Oregon ever to obtain subsidy from the National Wildlife Federation and the Oregon Wildlife Federation to sponsor such a program.

The local Fish and Game club in each county will choose one teacher from that county to attend the conservation workshop, and all of her expenses will be shared by the National Wildlife Federation, the Oregon Wildlife Federation, and the Fish and Game club which selected her to attend the program.

Many different phases of conservation will be considered by the group. Experts on the subjects of soils, water, forests, fish resources, and game resources will be present. These authorities will represent such concerns as the U.S. Soil Conservation Service, the Oregon Fish Commission, the Oregon Game Commission, Weyerhaeuser Lumber Company, the National Park Service, and the National Forest Service.

During the two-week course,

the group will have four hours of actual field experience each day plus two hours every evening devoted to conservation movies, discussion of the events of the afternoon, and planning of conservation programs for elementary schools.

The highlight of the course will be a week-end tour to the Tule Lake National Wildlife Refuge, where many species of wild ducks, geese, and other water fowl will be observed.

Honor Scholars At Annual Affair

Grizzlies Take Fourth in Meet

Mel Johnson's Ashland high school track squad came roaring back from some early season disappointing showings to cop fourth place in the annual Hayward relays last weekend.

The Grizzlies scored a solid 25 points in the annual classic, and ended just two points away from third place University high of Eugene. Cottage Grove captured the Class B relays with 42½ points. Crater high of Central Point, which had twice outscored the Grizzlies ended up in seventh place with 17 points.

The Ashlanders nabbed two first places of the 10 events in the large Class B field.

Bill Bates, Charles Bonds, Paul Yates, and Clarence Baker combined efforts to chalk up a 46.6 winning effort in the 440-yard relay. And Ted Tenney, Bill Hollingsworth and Lloyd Henry copped the high jump relay with a combined effort of 16 feet, 5 inches.

The Ashland shuttle hurdles relay team ended in fifth place and Winton Miller came in third in the individual discus event.

GARDEN NOTES

April is Month To Plant Corn

April 20 is generally considered the time to plant your first planting of corn. By planting an early variety of corn at this time you should have corn for the table by July 10. Under favorable circumstances you can beat this date a little, but the 10th of July would be a good date to shoot at.

Two of the better and earliest varieties of corn are Alpagold and Golden Hammer Cross. At the same time these early varieties are planted it would be well to make a small planting of the later varieties such as Golden Cross Bantam or Lochief. These varieties are about ten days slower and will be producing corn when the others are finishing. Several short rows should be planted instead of a long single row, as this is more favorable for good pollination and will insure well filled cobs. A planting of 5 rows 5 feet long every two weeks until the middle of June will keep an average family well supplied with corn from the 10th of July clear through September. If an additional supply is wanted for canning or freezing it would be well to make a little larger planting in early May. Corn planted at that time will grow rapidly and will mature in the heat of the summer when the highest quality corn is produced.

Corn is a heavy feeder and will respond well to an application of fertilizer. An ideal way to use the fertilizer would be to mix equal amounts of ammonium sulfate and superphosphate and place this 2 inches deep and 2 inches to one side of the seed. Four hundred pounds of this mixture placed in this manner would be sufficient for an acre. In the home garden where this placing is not practical, use a pound of ammonium sulfate or 4 pounds of a complete fertilizer on each 10-foot by 10-foot area and work it in before planting the seed.

For a maximum yield of high quality corn you can produce one stalk of corn to each foot of row. The rows should be about 3 feet apart. If more than one stalk is left to each foot of row, the ears will be small. If corn is grown that close, then it should be suckered. The earlier the suckers are removed the better it will be for the corn.

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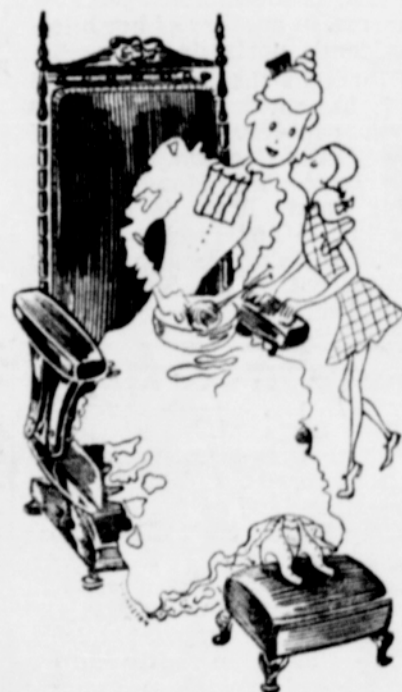
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
