### School People Urged to Enroll

Elementary school principals, teachers and superintendents of southern Oregon who are interested in improving education for children are urged to enroll now in the Northwest Regional Elementary School Principals' Work conference, according to Chester C. Squire, Ashland, chairman of the professional standards committee of the Oregon Elementary Principals association.

The second annual workshop will be held from June 16 to 27 at the University of Oregon.

"Interest in the program is extremely keen this year due to the excellence of last summer's conference," Squire said. "Since total enrollment must be limited, southern Oregon educators planning to attend will be wise to mail immediately their five dollar registration fees."

A staff of 22 elementary school experts from Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Montana and Utah will direct workshop sessions under the leadership of Dr. Adolph A. Sandin, associate professor of education at the University of Oregon. Major conference consideration will be study of the strengths, weaknesses, problems, needs and significant trends of the elementary schools.

Squire explained that three quarter hours for undergraduate or graduate credit may be obtained in the workshop which is listed as course title "Supervision of the Elementary School." Southern Oregon college has encouraged interested students to attend the Eugene conference for credit and continue summer study at the Ashland institution after June 17.

Morning sessions will be devoted to general assembly sessions with speakers discussing the general theme, "Leadership, the Key to Good Elementary Schools." In the afternoons, students will meet in individual groups to discuss problems of common interest.

Frankfurt, Germany — First Lt. James S. Campbell, son of Mr. and Mrs. B. R. Campbell, of 818 Kankakee St., Muskogee, Okla., will soon leave Germany with his wife and three children for duty with the 307th Military Police Battalion at Fort Sam Houston, Texas.

Mrs. Campbell, the former Betty Spencer, is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A. D. Spencer of Ashland, Ore.

Campbell has been in Germany for 36 months during his most recent tour of overseas duty. He is assistant chief agent of the Army's Criminal Investigation Division in Bad Hersfeld, Germany.

A graduate of Muskogee Central High School, Campbell joined the Army in 1940. Following wartime duty at various locations in the United States until early 1947, he arrived in Germany for duty in Frankfurt. Since then, he has been overseas, with the exception of ten months in the United States with the 101st Airborne Division at Camp Breckinridge, Ky.

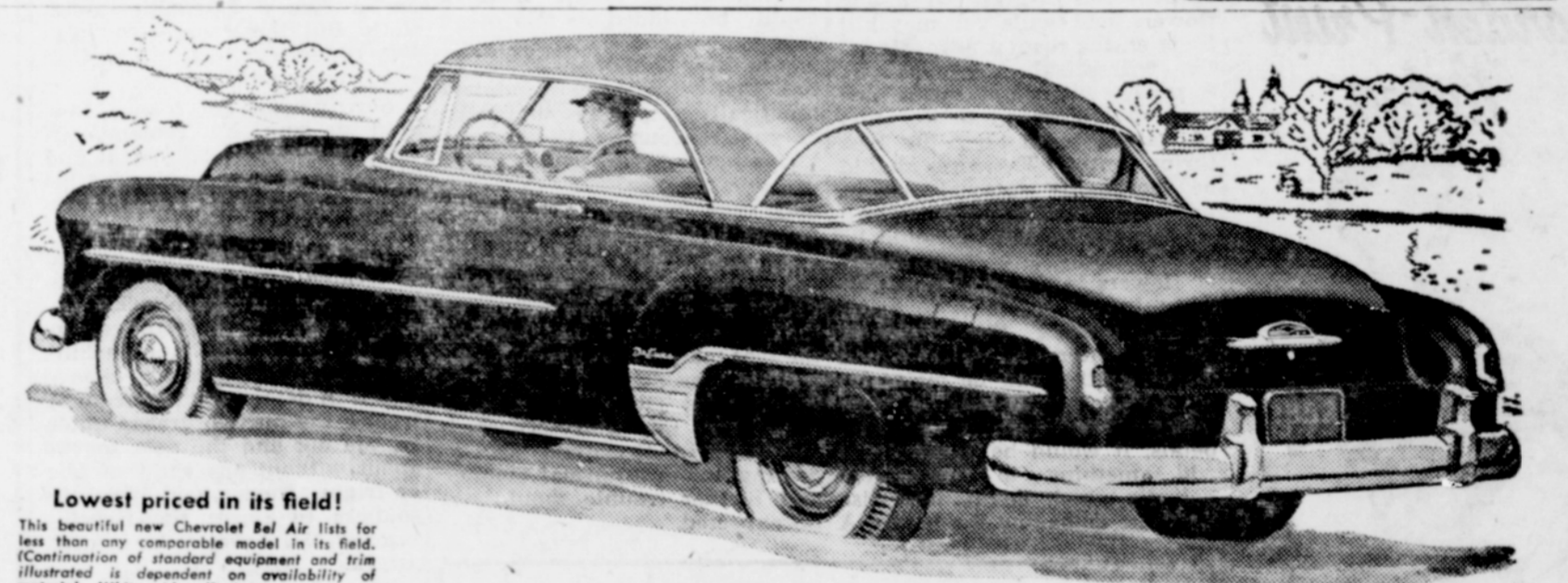
