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Traffic Lights For Main Street May Come Soon

Ashland may soon have stop lights at three downtown intersections at last as a result of the recent state highway commission survey.

City superintendent Elmer Biegel said that the survey estimated the traffic flow is heavy enough to warrant stop lights. A minimum of 7,200 vehicles past a given intersection each day is required before lights may be installed.

The recent check indicates that at least that many pass through the city each day.

The three intersections, all on E. Main street, are at Pioneer, First and Second streets. Mr. Biegel said that lights probably would not be installed at Oak and Third streets, where congestion seems less than at the other three intersections.

Also figured into the requirements for the stop lights is the pedestrian traffic at crosswalks in the intersections.

The lights would be paid half by the city and half by the state, according to Mr. Biegel. The city's share would come to about \$2500, he said.

Ashland Votes Hospital Issues Monday, June 23

Voters in the Ashland area of Jackson county go to the polls Monday in a special hospital district election, to vote on the establishment of a hospital district within the area and to elect 5 directors of the district, if it is approved.

Candidates for election are Don Lewis, who has headed the drive for establishing the district, Harry Morris, Abe Neslin, Harold Straus, Lyndal Newbury, Ralph Mickle, R. D. McCulloch, and Dee Newton.

Poling places are to be the Ashland City hall, Ashland Junior High school, the Talent City hall, the Klamath Junction cafe and Lincoln school at Pinehurst.

Mr. Lewis issued an appeal for a large vote. He declared the issue to be of vast importance to the future of the area involved.

To help in encouraging voters, Miss Florence Plakto, a member of the Valley View committee, today announced that cake will be served to all people who have voted. The "refreshment" reward for voters will be served at the Ashland Medical building Miss Plakto announced.

Announce College Grid Schedule

Southern Oregon college will meet all four teams of the Oregon collegiate conference as well as regular Far Western conference opponents in football contests next fall, according to a tentative schedule announced today by Donald E. Lewis, business manager.

The Red Raiders are members of the four-team Far Western loop officially, but have been invited on numerous occasions to join the Oregon league. Lewis said that Southern Oregon still honors its Far Western affiliation and will not compete with the Oregon colleges in official league play.

A season opener against Linfield at McMinnville is the only game scheduled outside of the two leagues, Lewis said. An open date on September 20 may still be filled, however.

Teams which will appear in Ashland games will be Eastern Oregon college, Portland State (formerly Vanport) and the Cal Aggies. The Raiders will meet Oregon College of Education at Coos Bay on Oct. 4 in the annual Myrtle Bowl game sponsored by the Shriners.

The complete schedule tentatively outlined follows:

Sept. 12, Linfield College, McMinnville; Sept. 27, Eastern Oregon College, Ashland; Oct. 4, Oregon College of Education, Coos Bay; Oct. 11, Humboldt State College, Arcata; Oct. 18, Chico State College, Chico; Oct. 25, Oregon Technical Institute, Klamath Falls; Nov. 1, Portland State College, Ashland; Nov. 8, Cal Aggies, Ashland.

Two New Teachers Assume Duties

Two faculty members who are permanent additions to the staff at Southern Oregon college assumed their new duties yesterday at the opening of the summer session, according to Dr. Elmo N. Stevenson, college president.

Mrs. Elinor C. Saltus, assistant professor of education, has succeeded Jeanette Smith as director of the library of children's literature. Mrs. Saltus studied at the University of North Dakota, University of Illinois and University of Michigan. She came to Southern Oregon from a similar position at Indianapolis.

John H. Waldo, instructor in education, has also assumed residence as director of the men's dormitory. He will conduct supervisory teaching at Jacksonville this summer and will take over a fourth grade class at the Lincoln Laboratory school next fall. Waldo came to Southern Oregon from a teaching position in the Portland schools.

Chief Joseph Meets Final Defeat

Back in the early 70's, there ranked among one of Idaho's famous Indian Tribes, Chief Joseph of the Nez-Perce Indians.

No other Indian Chief had the ability to accomplish the feat he had done, to out-manuever a well trained army such as that of the United States Cavalry and Infantry.

Keen and cunning in all his maneuvers on that long trail of nearly two thousand miles, from

territory from southern Texas to and across the Canadian border and back at the beginning of spring, to stay late in the fall.

Those great buffalo herds were killed and destroyed unmercifully by the white invader and eastern sportsmen, by permission of the American government. This was to one advantage — a barricade to subdue the Indian progress of massacres and control of the northwest.

The redskins would, and were always out to kill and massacre as long as there was wild meat on hand.

Now the Nez-Perces' blood was at a boiling heat of revenge. Nothing could stop them but fight and wait. They plowed through like a fire-ball from the heavens. Chief Joseph's savages were out of control most of the time, "it was win or die."

After Chief Joseph winning a battle at White Bird canyon and Clearwater, he moved on cautiously over the famous old Indian trail, the Lo, Lo Pass, nearly sixty miles through the Sawtooth range of the Rocky mountains. Some geological maps give it the name, the Bitter-Root range. Old-timers called these mountains that name.

After leaving the Lo, Lo Pass,

they headed straight up the Bitter Root valley in the west side of the Bitter Root River for at least sixty-five miles, then making another hard climb over the summit on Deer creek declining down into the Big Hole Basin.

Here on this creek about seven miles from the summit, is where the third battle took place and sixty-some troops were killed or wounded. Chief Joseph lost eighty braves, killed, and it never could be estimated how many wounded. Civilians lost six killed and seven or eight wounded.

Here on this battle ground Chief Joseph carried off the honors of being victorious again in his third battle. Then with over eighteen hundred warriors he left in the shadow of darkness and was then overtaken again by Howard and Gibbons at Camas Prairie. Here Chief Joseph whipped Howard's Command again, making this his fourth winning battle at Camas Prairie.

Chief Joseph Enters Yellowstone After the Indians dispersed from the Camas Battle Grounds, leaving many of their dead and wounded, as they had no time to lose, they made a short camp near Lake Henry, just before entering Thatcher's Pass. Breaking
