

Klamath Artists Begin Workshop

Klamath Falls — The fourth Klamath Art Workshop, an annual summer study in creative expression alternating each year between various art media, has been announced for July 7 to August 1, with painting, graphics, and crafts receiving the emphasis this year.

Started in 1949 by a small group of enthusiasts interested in the artistic development — historically, scenically and progressively — of this mile-high region close to the fringes of the nation's last primitive areas, the workshop immediately gained national attention because of the leading artists who came from the metropolitan centers to instruct here during the season.

In the trio of workshops already given there has been heard such voices of artistic authority as Emmy Zwaybruck, internationally known designer for Macy's, Lord and Taylor, Marshall-Field, and director of the Prang Studio of the American Crayon Company; James Edward Peck, director of art at the Cornish School in Seattle and creator of advertising art for Ford Motor company, General Electric, Westinghouse, and twice winner of Guggenheim fellowships; Hardie Gramatky, famous American water color artist, author, magazine illustrator and member of the National Academy of Design; and Vern Swanson, recognized California and Oregon painter now in France at the University of Nice and whose water colors and oils New York Architectural League; and others.

Instruction this year will be by Louis Bunce, who has gained international attention through his one-man showings at the Museum of Modern Art in New York and the Cincinnati Art Museum and through his selection for representation in the Metropolitan Museum's recent "American Painting, 1950" exhibition and the exclusive Whitney Museum annual; and Roy W. Malery, outstanding Oregon art educator and designer.

PROSPECT MAN CITED IN KOREAN FIGHTING

WITH THE 40th INFANTRY DIV. IN KOREA — Army Sergeant First Class John Dolenshek, Prospect, Ore., recently received a commendation from an Air Force general for his action as a part of a 14-man patrol which rescued a downed air observer under enemy fire.

SFC Dolenshek is a member of Company E, 224th Infantry Regiment, the unit which sent out the patrol. The observer, 1st Lt. W. P. R. Talpott of Norfolk, England, parachuted from a stricken plane after it was hit by Communist fire. Seeing the parachute open, the 14 E Company men volunteered to rescue him while Air Force planes circled the area to offer overhead protection.

Upon hearing of the rescue mission, Lt. Gen. O. P. Weyland, commander of the Far East Air Forces, forwarded the following message to Dolenshek and his companions:

"This action, coordinated with covering artillery fire, is worthy of the highest praise and further cements the spirit of comradeship between air and ground forces. Please accept my sincere thanks and admiration.

In forwarding the message, Maj. Gen. Daniel H. Hudelson, commander of the 40th Infantry Division, added his personal commendation.

Talent Soldier Returns Home from Korean Service

With the 3d Infantry Div. in Korea — Cpl. Allen R. Speece, whose wife, Eloise, lives on Rt. 1, Box 153, Talent is returning to the U. S. on rotation after serving with the 3d Infantry Division in Korea.

The 3d early in the war held off the Chinese during the famed Hamburg-Hungnam beachhead withdrawal of more than 100,000 UN troops. Last fall, it smashed the enemy back from their deeply-entrenched winter line in the battle of "Bloody Angle."

Corporal Speece, a wheeled vehicle mechanic in Headquarters Company of the 15th Infantry Regiment, arrived in Korea last September. He received his basic training at Fort Lewis, Wash.

Before entering the Army in January 1951, he was employed by the Fruit Grower's Supply, Hill, Calif.

LOCAL SAILOR IN PACIFIC

Among the 2200 crewmen serving aboard the battleship USS Iowa in Korean waters, is Wilmer W. Wiley, Jr., seaman apprentice, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. Wilmer W. Wiley of Ashland.

Since leaving "mothballs" to relieve her sister battleship, the USS Wisconsin, the Iowa has continued to bombard the Communists in round-the-clock support of United Nations ground troops.

During her first month of combat, the 45,000-ton Iowa hurled more than 1,000 rounds of one-ton, 16" projectiles, and over 3,000 rounds of 5" shells on Red installations along the East coast of North Korea.
