Noted Visitors Will Be Guests As Festival Opens

Press and radio representatives, state and city officials, educators, and other distinguished visitors will be guests of the Shakespearean festival association, the city and Southern Oregon college at a buffet supper before the opening of the festival here on August 1.

As usual, the buffet supper will be open to the public. Reservations can be made by calling the festival office, Ashland 2-8636.

The supper will be served at Suzanne Homes hall on the college campus at 6:30 p.m. Reservations are \$1.50 a plate. E. H. Singmaster, vice-president of the association, is general chairman of the program and Mrs. Harry A. Skerry is in charge of the buffet.

Following the buffet, visitors and festival patrons will hear a special program of Elizabethan music at the theatre, beginning at 7:45 p.m., then see the opening play, "The Tempest."

Festival officials stressed that opening night ceremonies at the theatre would be brief, as last year. There will be no speeches. Distinguished visitors will be introduced and the festival will be officially opened. That part of the program will take approximately 5 minutes.

Reports from the box office indicate that excellent seats are still available for opening night. Because of the unusually large number of people from outside the area attending this year, most of them coming on weekends later in the season, opening night is not as crowded as are later dates.

WHEN YOUR "E" BONDS MATURE

The Treasury Department offers three choices to holders of Series E, United States Defense Bonds, when their Bonds mature: **Choices:** You may: *One*, accept cash, if you so desire; *Two*, continue to hold the present bond with an automatic interest-bearing extension; *Three*, exchange your bonds in amounts of \$500 or multiples for a Defense Bond of Series G, which earns current income at the rate of 2½ percent payable semi-annually.

Action: If you want to obtain cash, you simply present your bond, with proper identification, to any paying agent. If you want to extend the matured bond you have ABSOLUTELY NOTHING TO DO—just continue to hold it. Extended bonds may be cashed at any time you wish. If you want a G Bond, see your bank for details.

Interest: The extended bond will earn simple interest on the face amount at the rate of 2½ percent for the first seven and one-half years. Thereafter it will be at a higher rate sufficient to provide a total return for the 10-year extension period of 2.9 percent compounded.

Taxes: You have the choice of (1) reporting E Bond interest for Federal income taxes on an annual basis or (2) paying the taxes on the interest in the year when the bonds finally mature or are redeemed. The privilege of deferring taxes does not apply if the E Bond is exchanged for a G Bond.
