**County 'E' Bond Sales Reach Quarter Million in First Half**

While the cost of living rose during the first half of 1952, Oregon residents purchased over 11 million dollars in series E defense bonds — an amount equal to the corresponding period last year.

"Throughout the state a total of \$11,201,406 in E bonds was purchased," Morris B. Leonard, Sr., county defense bond chairman, stated. "An additional \$2,497,152 were bought in all other series defense bonds, to bring the total sales for the first half of 1952 to \$13,698,558. The substantial purchase of small denomination series E bonds, primarily by payroll savers, reflects a healthy thrift pattern that is highly commendable and desirable for a sound business economy."

County sales in all series during the same period amounted to \$295,256.00.

Leonard pointed out that defense bond purchases during the past two months in Oregon and throughout the nation took a big jump to overcome the slack sales earlier in the year. "Over 150 per cent more bonds were purchased in May and June of this year, moreover, than in 1941 when the first savings bonds were issued. This is partly due to the new three per cent interest on the new E and H defense bonds," he said, "and to the growing number of payroll savers in state and nation-wide industries."

Leonard anticipates an in-

crease in defense bond purchases just as soon as the new bonds are printed, engraved, and distributed to banks and post-offices. "We have been issuing 'interim' receipts," he stated, "and many persons have withheld purchases until they can actually receive the new engraved bonds. Distribution of the new series should take place within a week or two."

**CARLSON IN N.Y.**

Fort Wadsworth, N. Y. — Cpl. Vernon L. Carlson, 128 Central Ave., Ashland, is participating in "Operation Signpost," the exercise geared to put the air defenses of the U. S. on an operational basis.

He is a member of the Army's 52nd Anti-Aircraft Artillery Brigade which guards the New York-New Jersey area.

The brigade is working with the civilian Ground Observer Corps (GOC) and with Canadian air defense forces during the July 19-28 exercise.

A gun commander, Carlson entered the Army in February, 1951.

**WHEN YOUR "E" BONDS MATURE**

The Treasury Department offers three choices to holders of Series E, United States Defense Bonds, when their Bonds mature:

**Choices:** You may: *One*, accept cash, if you so desire; *Two*, continue to hold the present bond with an automatic interest-bearing extension; *Three*, exchange your bonds in amounts of \$500 or multiples for a Defense Bond of Series G, which earns current income at the rate of 2½ percent payable semi-annually.

**Action:** If you want to obtain cash, you simply present your bond, with proper identification, to any paying agent. If you want to extend the matured bond you have **ABSOLUTELY NOTHING TO DO**—just continue to hold it. Extended bonds may be cashed at any time you wish. If you want a G Bond, see your bank for details.

**Interest:** The extended bond will earn simple interest on the face amount at the rate of 2½ percent for the first seven and one-half years. Thereafter it will be at a higher rate sufficient to provide a total return for the 10-year extension period of 2.9 percent compounded.

**Taxes:** You have the choice of (1) reporting E Bond interest for Federal income taxes on an annual basis or (2) paying the taxes on the interest in the year when the bonds finally mature or are redeemed. The privilege of deferring taxes does not apply if the E Bond is exchanged for a G Bond.
