

## Oregonians Take European Trips

Oregon residents are flocking to Europe in record numbers, and foreign travel by Oregonians this year may exceed last year's figure by 40 per cent.

This is the estimate given by Lloyd Crowe, manager of the Oregon State Motor Association's touring department.

The American Automobile Association is forecasting that the all-time record number of American tourists to Europe during a single year — 300,000 in 1950 — may be broken this year by as much as 40 per cent.

Crowe says he believes Oregon travelers will equal or exceed the AAA percentage estimate.

Request for routings, information and procedure for shipping cars far exceeds those of any previous year, the touring expert reports.

Housewives top the list of those taking foreign vacations. Crowe says, with laborers, clerks and secretaries also high on the list.

Western Europe is still the number one tourist objective, he points out, with Latin America and Canada becoming increasingly popular.

## MOTHER'S HELPER

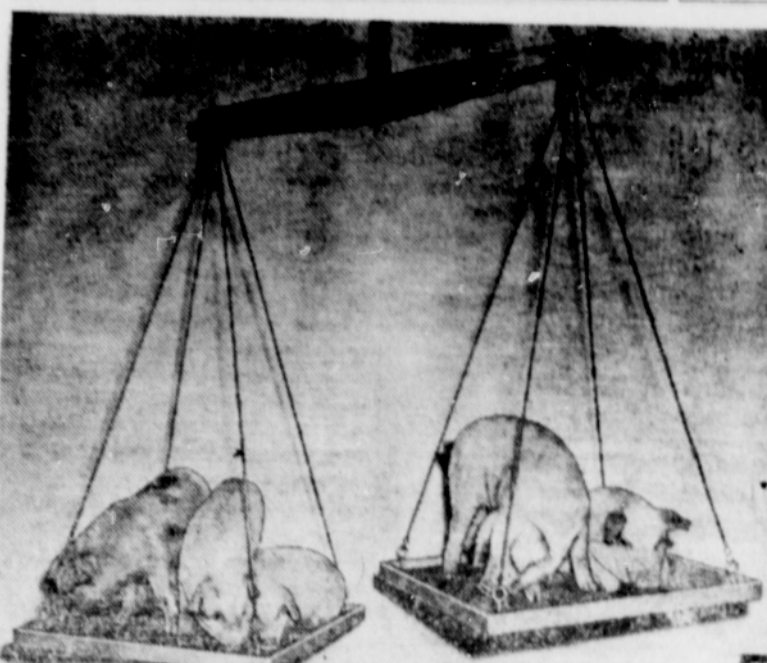
## Sales By August 15 Must List Timber

The logging and lumber industry is reminded that suggestions for tracts of O. & C. timber which they would like to have put up for sale in calendar year 1952 should be submitted to the Medford Forest District headquarters in the Medford city hall on or before August 15, 1952. Suggestion forms are available in the district office.

A total of 110,000,000 board feet is tentatively scheduled for sale next year in the Jackson, Josephine and Klamath master units. Priority will be given to the sale of wind-thrown or beetle-killed or infested timber. However since there are apparently only small tracts of this type of salvage timber in the Medford District, most of the sales will consist of green timber.

In general, only old-growth timber where access to roads or rights-of-way are equal to all bidders will be selected for sale. Also the tracts of timber will be well distributed over the entire district and arranged so that the available sustained yield cut in each of the twenty administrative units in the district is not exceeded.

All indications of interest received for specific tracts of timber will be examined by Bureau of Land Management foresters on the Medford staff and then considered by the 13-man District Advisory Board. Final Timber sale plan for 1953 will then be announced in December of this year.
