Inside the hidden and mysterious world of North Korea, Kim lived a young boy's normal life until he was five years old. Disaster struck when the first wave of the Great Famine hit — a long, terrible ordeal that killed millions, including his father, and sent others, like his mother and only sister, on desperate escape routes into China. Alone on the streets, Kim learned to beg and steal. Finally, in desperation, he too crossed a frozen river to escape to China. There a kindly Christian woman took him in, kept him hidden from the authorities, and gave him hope.
