Call for Letters of Intent

The Oregon Department of Justice (DOJ), Crime Victims' Services Division (CVSD) is requesting a **Call for Letters of Intent** to compete for culturally specific grant funding to provide direct advocacy services and support to survivors of domestic violence, sexual assault, dating violence and stalking. CVSD is seeking a non-profit community agency to carry out a continuum of culturally specific services for domestic violence and sexual assault survivors in Washington County within the Asian, South Asian, Southeast Asian and Pacific Islander communities. The suitable non-profit must be able to offer culturally specific services that:

1. Provides safety for and assists victims of domestic violence and sexual assault, promotes effective intervention and reduces the incidence of domestic violence and sexual assault;
2. Advocates for victims and for domestic and sexual assault services; and
3. Promotes and facilitates interagency and inter-departmental cooperation among county and city based government agencies, law enforcement, criminal justice system, non-profits and among different levels of government in this state in the delivery and funding of services

This grant opportunity will be funded by two sources: Victims of Crime Act (VOCA) and the Oregon Domestic and Sexual Violence Services (ODSVS).
