## PLANS FOR ENLARGING THE WHITE HOUSE.

## 1899 TAX ROLL.

THE AMOUNT DELINQUENT.

Following is the report of W. W. Withers, Sheriff and Tax Collector of Lane county, on the tax roll of 1899, showing the original roll, collections, corrections and amount delinquent, August 15, 1900, at which time the rolls were closed for the purpose of extending the delinquent roll.

Sheriff Withers has been receiving money on taxes during the time the rolls have been closed, and costs will not be added until about October 10. By that time the delinquent amount, \$15,680.33, will be materially reduced; in fact, over \$2000 of it having been received for while the delinquent rolls were being rewritten:
