Electric Light Question.

Next Monday the voters of this city will be called upon to decide whether or not they will accept the proposition of B. A. Stafford & Co., of Albany, to light this city with electricity.

That the people may understand the proposition and vote on the matter intelligently, we will try and explain it as lucidly as possible and according to the written terms of the proposed contract and the statement of Mr. Jos. Ralston, of Albany, representing the company.

At this election the voters are not asked to grant or give away any franchise, but simply to vote to empower the Council to make a contract with this company to furnish the city with electric lights for a period of ten years, at \$50 per month. The company agrees to put in are lights of 2000 candle power and incandescent street lights of 32-candle power, the are lights to cost \$8 each per month and the incandescent lights \$2 each per month. If two are lights are put in at \$16, that would give the city seventeen incandescent lights at \$34, making \$50 all told. The company further agrees to keep the lights in repair and replace them with new ones when necessary.

Mr. Ralston says that his company, if given the contract, will give Junction the same are light for \$8 per month that the city of Lebanon is now paying \$10 per month for under a ten-years' contract.

This plant, if installed, will be run by water power and Harrisburg and Junction City both lighted by the same power. The promoters claim that by using water power and lighting both cities with the same plant they are enabled to make the cost so moderate. To install a plant in Junction City alone and use steam power the cost would be double what they now ask. The contract calls for all-night power.

The citizens of Harrisburg, we are informed, are a unit in favor of the proposition, and it depends upon Junction to make it a go.

Junction City needs better lights, and

needs them badly. To have the city lighted with electricity would be a long step in the direction of improvement, and would be an advertisement for the city that would over-balance the cost. Thousands of intending settlers from the Eastern States will visit the towns in this valley from now until next fall, and the ones that make the best showing will reap the greatest benefit from this increased immigration. The street lights that we now have will have to be replaced with some kind of a light by next fall. Let the voters give this matter the thought it deserves, and settle it decisively at the polls next Monday.

A poll of the business men of the city discloses the fact that a majority are in favor of the proposition.
