Car Robbery.

Two freight cars standing on the side track back of the depot were broken into Sunday night by thieves. A box containing twelve pair of shoes consigned to W. H. Kay, of Monroe, were broken open, and all the shoes taken. In the car were about a dozen sacks of peas for Millhorn Bros., of this city, and the robbers had emptied the contents of one sack on the floor of the car and used the sack in which to carry off the shoes. In the other car a box of oranges, consigned to the Cascade Drug Co., had been opened and about a half of oranges taken. Marshal J. J. Darnelle said Monday morning, that he found plenty of orange peelings at the hojo camp in the north part of town. Efforts are being made to apprehend the thieves.

Died.

Colville, Wash., April 1.—Marcus Oppenheimer, for nearly 40 years a resident of Stevens County, and founder of the town of Marcus, died at Colville yesterday, of old age. Deceased was widely known throughout Eastern Washington and Northern Idaho. He was one of the first settlers in this section. He was born in Germany, and came to Washington with two brothers, Samuel and Joseph, both of whom died several years ago. He had traveled all over this section, and in early days was an Indian trader and Government contractor. He was for many years engaged in the general merchandise business at Colville, but retired from active life about four years ago. He was never married.

Deceased was an uncle of Mrs. Isaac Sanders, of this city, and the funeral occurred in Portland yesterday morning.

The second annual report of the Oregon Historical Society has been received. It is a pamphlet 6 1/2 x 9 1/2 inches and contains 124 pages. It shows that the society had 627 members on Nov. 30, 1900, distributed in twenty-three counties in Oregon and four in Washington. Pulpit Not a Bulletin Board.

"The reading of secular notices from the pulpit is a jar to the services: is exceedingly objectionable to a large number of people," writes Edward Bok, in the March Ladies' Home Journal. "These folk rightly feel that secular matters should be kept as far removed from the Sabbath services as possible. And they are perfectly justified in taking that position. It is a bit disturbing when a minister announces that a fair will be held on such or such a day, or that a strawberry festival has been arranged for a certain evening. All our churches cannot abolish pulpit announcements too soon; many of them have done so already. They have never had a place there; they are not in keeping with the dignity of the pulpit. Of course, where a church is absolutely too limited in its finances to have the most modest sort of a leaflet printed there is some reason for the continuance of the method. But whenever it is possible the pastors of our churches should be allowed to adopt the circular plan. The minister should not be turned into an advertising medium under any pretext whatever. Nor should the pulpit be dragged from its high place and its lofty purpose. It is not a bulletin-board."
