Weekly Crop Bulletin. U. S. DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE. POSTLAND, April 8.

GENERAL SUMMARY.

The week ending April 8 has been unseasonably cold, wet and cloudy. In the western part of the State the rainfail has been excessive, while in the eastern portion the amount is not so the indications are for frosts again Tuesday morning. In Eastern Oregon the temperature has been between 4 deg. above to 8 deg. below the freezing point every night of the week.

The maximum, cr day, temperatures from Junction City, on the Eugene road ; in Western Oregon ranged between 44 no buildings; most all in cultivation deg. and 58 deg., and the minimum, or | and good quality of land. night, temperatures between 30 deg. and 40 deg. In Eastern Oregon the day temperatures ranged between 36 deg. and between 24 deg and 36 deg

The soil everywhere is wet to a good place. depth, and with the advent of warmer, drying weather plowing and seeding will be actively resumed in all sections of the State.

The fall-sown grain is making a slow and healthy growth, exept on the lowlands in Western and Southern Oregon, where many complain of its turning a sickly reddish yellow. No insect pests have yet harmed the grain to any noteworthy extent.

Hops are slowly beginning to sprout. But little gardening has been done, and early vegetables will probably be late in the market this year

Stock did not winter quite as well as usual, and the backwardness of the season makes pasturage short, but with the advent of warmer weather, pasturage will quickly improve and stock begin to fatten.

The cold rains and frosts of the week have injured early fruit to some extent, but the blooms have been checked by the cold and the damage is not serious. Peaches, apricots, early varieties of cherries and early prunes are now in bloom.

Warmer weather, with bright spinshine, is needed in every portion of the State to advance growth and to enable Seattle Fruit & Produce the farmers to complete their plowing
