WEEKLY CROP BULLETIN.
U. S. DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE,
PORTLAND, May 20.
GENERAL SUMMARY.

Warm and partly cloudy weather prevailed until Thursday afternoon, when a change to cooler, accompanied by showery conditions, began and continued the remainder of the week. Frosts occurred Monday morning in the eastern portion of the State and on Saturday morning at a few exposed places in the western portion. The frosts, however, were not heavy enough to cause material damage. The maximum temperatures during the week in Western Oregon ranged between 54 Deg. and 74 Deg., and the minimum temperatures between 42 Deg. and 54 Deg. In Eastern Oregon the maximum temperatures ranged between 52 Deg. and 82 Deg., and the minimum temperatures between 32 and 58 Deg.

Fall wheat, rye and barley continue in excellent condition, and that farthest advanced has begun to head. Spring wheat and oats have made a good growth, and there is no complaint of insect pests damaging either fall or spring sown grain in any section of the State. Alfalfa, clover, tame grass and pastures are doing splendidly and the prospects now are excellent for a good crop of hay. Stock is getting fat. Sheep shearing is well advanced and the wool clip, while not quite as heavy as last year, is reported very good.

Gardens, although backward, are doing well, and there is an abundance of early vegetables in the market. Potato and corn planting and summer fallowing are practically completed. Correspondents generally report an increased acreage in potatoes and corn. Corn needs more rain and warmer weather in the Southern counties, but elsewhere it is doing nicely and its cultivation is in general progress. Hops continue thrifty and promising.

Complaints regarding the dropping of Italian prunes have increased over the northern portion of the Willamette valley and the yields there will fall short of former expectations. The outlook for a good crop of apples continues favorable.

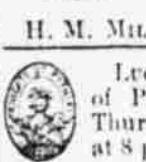

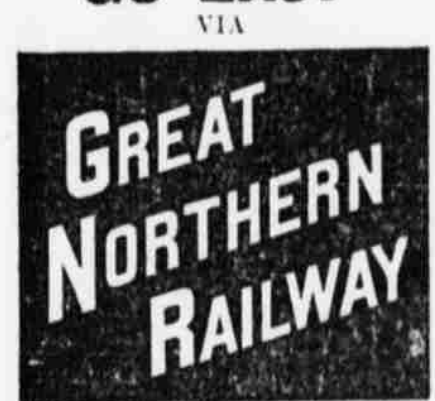
