Obituary.

Died, at 4 a. m., Sunday, July 14, 1901, Evelyn L. Barton, after a lingering illness, aged 21 years 4 months and 10 days.

In the death of Evelyn Barton Junction City loses one of its most exemplary young ladies. She was a devout Christian, a member of the M. E. church and the choir of that church; also a member of the Epworth League, Christian Endeavor and Rebekahs, which latter society conducted the burial.

The funeral took place from the M. E. church, Monday afternoon, at 2 o'clock, Rev. J. H. Skidmore, pastor, saying the last and but consoling words before consigning all that was mortal of this universally beloved one to its eternal resting place. "Blessed Are They Who Die in the Lord" was the text of the minister's remarks, and he proved convincingly that the blessed state began at the very moment that the soul left the body. Rev. Skidmore held up to the view of the congregation the Bible which belonged to Miss Barton, when alive, and on the fly leaf, printed in large letters by her own hand, were these words: "Thou, God, Seest Me." Numerous passages throughout the Book were underscored, and Rev. Skidmore spoke of the marvelous insight of one so young. At the close of his remarks there was scarcely a dry eye in the house. It must have been a telling strain upon the members of the choir, who furnished the vocal music on this occasion, when they thought of how often the sweet voice of the departed one had mingled with their own in singing praises to the Most High—yet never again.

The interment took place in the Odd Fellows' cemetery.

CROP REPORT.

The United States Weather Bureau reports the conditions of crops in Oregon, which in part, says:

The week has been dry, except in the southern and eastern portions of the State, where Friday and Saturday a few small showers occurred.

Haying is nearing completion and the crop, as a whole, is an average one and has been secured in excellent condition. The second crop of alfalfa is making satisfactory progress. Catwrens have appeared in the clover fields in Clackamas, Marion, Linn and Curry counties, but they are not nearly so numerous as they were last year. The ranges are trying up, as is usual at this season of the year, but stock continues in excellent condition. The harvest of fall-sown grain is becoming general. Wheat, oats, rye and barley in the Willamette valley continue doing well. The heads are large and well filled with plump berries. Hops are generally free from lice and making satisfactory progress.

GLASS FIRE CAN'T BREAK.

Product of a British Factory That is Said to Be Proof Against Burglars.

For years the Pilkington glass works in Lancashire, England, have been conducting experiments designed to produce fireproof and burglarproof glass, and for the first time these experiments were crowned with success. To the molten glass a wire netting was added, and the composition resulting resisted all inroads of fire or other violent agencies. Doors of this material have proved unbreakable, and even when subjected to 2,500 degrees Fahrenheit remained unaffected, while ordinary doors grew red hot. The new composition is expected to be a great commercial success.
