USE OF PSYCHOLOGY IN INDUSTRY IS PREDICTED

In twenty years the modern theory of psychology will be applied in all our big industrial plants to determine the mental fitness of those applying for work.

School teachers too, will have such a knowledge of the science and they will be able to make a psychological analysis of the mental mechanism of their pupils and determine the vocations they should follow through life.

These are two of the conclusions reached by Prof. Hugo Munsterberg, of Harvard University, during a recent lecture on "Psychology and Vocation."

Professor Munsterberg said three large industrial plants in Philadelphia have taken steps toward applying the psychological tests to all applicants for work.

The Pennsylvania railroad is making the attempt to apply the science in the examination of engineers to eliminate accidents.

With the advent of the scientific management and the tendency to specialization it becomes necessary to determine the occupation best adapted to a man or woman.

The bad features of the old, clumsy system of selecting men, in which seventy-three per cent are failures, will be eliminated, when workers are chosen by trained psychologists. Thus three-fourths of energy now wasted can be saved.

Every boy can find his right place and vocation. To be successful the mind and the work must be adjusted.

Prof. Munsterberg tells us this can be accomplished by the application of the Science of Psychology.—Philadelphia North American.
