MUST KEEP RECORD OF NARCOTICS SOLD

Springfield physicians have received copies of the circular sent out by the federal authorities acquainting them with the law aimed to check the use of habit-forming drugs, which goes into effect March 1.

Under the act, physicians and dentists will violate the law if they have in possession any opium, coca leaves, compound or derivative, including morphine, codein, cocaine or heroin, unless they have registered with the collector of internal revenue and have paid a special annual tax of \$1. Violation of any provision of the drug act subjects the violator to a fine the minimum of which is \$50.

The law is very strict and under it physicians must keep a complete record of drugs used, the hour and minute administered to a patient and the name of the patient and his address.

The records must be open to federal inspection.

Dentists will be required to keep a record also, but not so minute.
