**Leases County Ground.**  
R. R. Harbert, of Springfield, yesterday leased a tract of land owned by the county at the north approach of the Hendrick bridge across the McKenzie river and will fence it and use it for pasture. The county bought this tract several years ago in order that it might erect a breakwater for the purpose of protecting the bridge. It has been lying idle and open since and has not been used by the county. Harbert pays the county \$5 a year for the use of the land. It consists of about seven acres, but one acre will be left open so that travelers may camp there as they have for many years past.
