## COMPLETE ROAD TO ALSEA BAY

Portland, May 13.—Forest  
service officials at Portland an-  
nounce that the Alsea river road  
between Waldport and Tide-  
water, Oregon, will be completed  
in time to insure its use by July  
1st.

This road, which is two miles  
in length, is inside the Siuslaw  
National forest, and will com-  
plete the highway between  
Waldport and the Willamette  
valley. Heretofore it has been  
necessary for all traffic to go by  
boat from Tidewater to Wald-  
port. There was a road, but it  
was little more than a trail in  
places, and not at all suitable for  
heavy loads. The demand for a  
better road has been insistent for  
some time, but plans for im-  
provement or development were  
helped up by certain local condi-  
tions, and the actual work of  
construction was not begun un-  
til last fall. Now, however, 80  
per cent of the work is com-  
pleted. It has been a somewhat  
difficult and expensive piece of  
road construction because of the  
heavy side hill cut, mostly in the  
solid rock.

North Bend—Work of paving

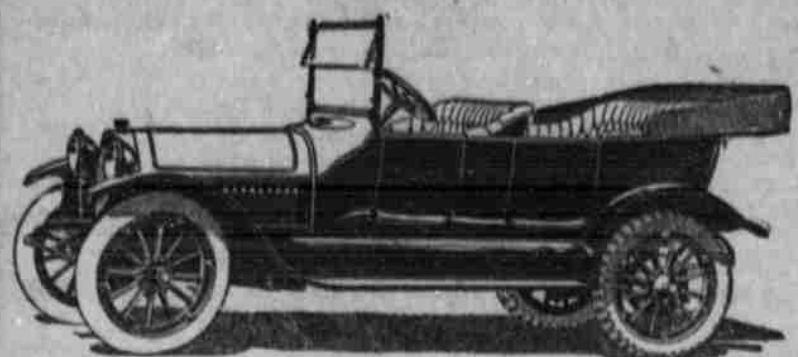
RESTORATION TO ENTRY OF  
LANDS IN NATIONAL FOREST.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT  
the lands described below, em-  
bracing 140 acres, within the Cas-  
cade and Siuslaw National Forests, Ore-  
gon, will be subject to settlement and
