EXPERT ADVISES USE OF BLOCKS

Eugene officials favoring the use of wood block pavement in Eugene are interested in the arrival in Oregon of C. H. Teesdale, a government expert in charge of the section of wood preservation of the forest products laboratory, at Madison, Wisconsin. This laboratory is a branch of the forest service that conducts practical tests on all kinds of timber. He is a strong advocate of the pavement recommended by City Engineer Forneri for Eugene.

Mr. Teesdale, who was in Portland yesterday, was chairman of the committee of the American Wood Preservers' association which made a lengthy report on the history of treated wood block pavements in the United States at the annual meeting of the association in Chicago last January.

"Creosoted wood block is a popular form of pavement in the eastern and central United States," said Mr. Teesdale. "The borough of Manhattan, New York, has over thirty miles of this pavement. Minneapolis 100 miles of wood block paving, more than all other forms combined, with much of it in the residence sections. The downtown or loop district of Chicago, which is subject to very heavy traffic, is largely paved with wood block.

"One reason for the popularity of wood block is its noiselessness. This is the principal reason for its use in the business sections of eastern cities, where it is often demanded by the tenants of office buildings. Its durability under heavy traffic also makes it acceptable to the city officials who are responsible for its maintenance. Another factor is the ease of making repairs and low maintenance cost.

"The difficulties which were formerly experienced with wood block have now been largely overcome. In the cities where it is largely used the cases of failure which have occasionally been experienced have usually been shown to be due either to the use of poor material or to improper construction of the pavement. Wood block is now generally recognized as a standard pavement, the principal objection against it being its comparatively great cost.

"In the eastern portion of the United States wood block costs more than most other forms of paving. On the Pacific coast, however, this difference in cost is not so great. It is interesting to note that wood block finds its largest use in the section of the country where its cost is highest."—Guard.

BABCOCK TESTERS MUST SECURE STATE LICENSE

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, May 19.—All buyers of milk and cream for manufacture and all operators of Babcock testers on milk or cream designed to be bought on a butter fat basis for manufacture, must secure a license to continue in business after May 22, 1915. It will also be unlawful to use for these tests glassware other than standard that has been examined for accuracy and marked with the letters S. G. O., meaning standard glassware, Oregon.

The purpose of the law is to prevent discrimination in receiving and purchasing milk and butter fat and to provide a uniform method of sampling, weighing and testing milk, cream and butter fat. The law should also result in aiding those dairy and creamery men who are earnestly striving to improve the quality of milk products in this state, and incidentally remove one of the most serious hindrances to co-operative dairy

manufacture.

Licenses for operating the tester on market milk may be secured from the state dairy and food commissioner upon presentation of a certificate from the chief of the Dairy department of the Agricultural College. Examinations for this certificate will be announced from time to time by circular letter and through the press, and will consist of actual laboratory testing and a written examination on sampling, testing and composition of milk and cream.

The glassware will be inspected at the College by the Dairy department and if found standard it will be properly branded and returned to the owner. It should be sent charges prepaid accompanied by three cents for each article to be examined. If not standard the pieces will be returned at the owner's expense. In ordering new glassware it should be stipulated that it must conform to the S. G. O. requirements.

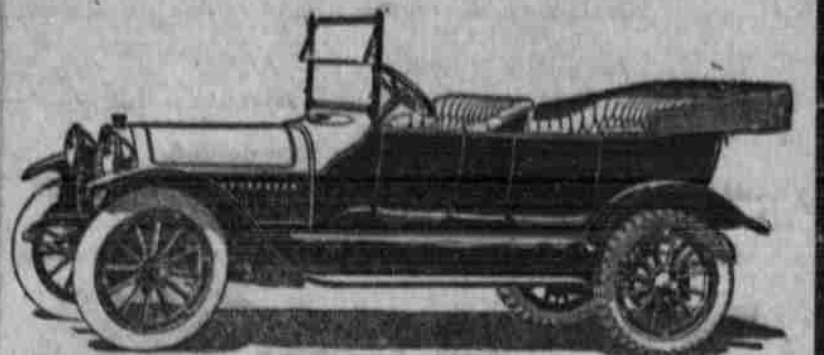
