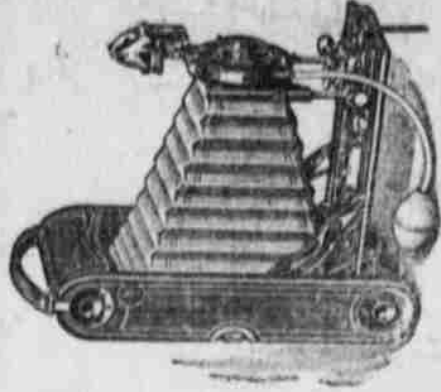

August 9th to 16th inclusive is to be "All Oregon Week" at the Oregon building, with exercises extraordinary on the 9th and special days continuing through the week. Everything possible to bring Oregon to the attention of the Exposition crowds will be attempted during the season of activity. All sorts of plans are under consideration and it is certain a magnificent week's program will be worked out. It is expected that several Oregon bands and marching organizations will be here at that time and that many of Oregon's distinguished citizens will be here to participate in one way or another.
