EUGENE PLANS DOLLAR DAY

Eugene will have a Dollar Day, Wednesday, September 22, has been definitely decided upon, both by the Dollar Day committee of the Lane County Credit Association and the Fair Board. On this date the merchants of that city are planning to offer for sale goods that possess a far greater value than the dollar for that sum. It will also be the opening day of the Lane County Fair. The committee and fair board are co-operating to make this day one of the biggest events ever scheduled in Eugene, both from the standpoint of the entertainment of the visitor and the standpoint of the wonderful bargains that will be offered for a dollar on that day. CHICAGO BANKER SEES BRIGHT DAY DAWNING FOR COAST TIMBERMEN

George M. Reynolds, President of Continental & Commercial National Bank, Issues Bulletin on Business Outlook.

In the main, fundamental conditions in this country are pronounced sound, or at least regarded as satisfactory, by Geo. M. Reynolds, president of the Continental & Commercial National Bank, of Chicago, who has just issued a summary of the bank's annual business review, based on 6500 letters and advices received from all parts of the United States.

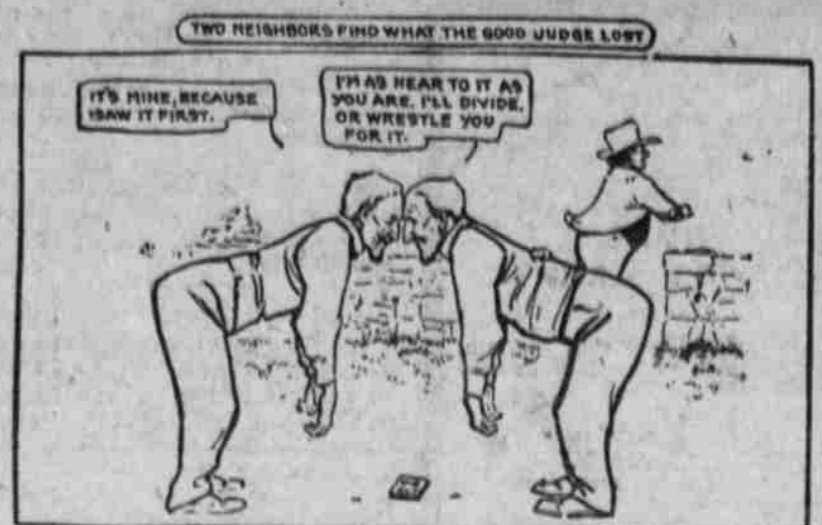
"With an agricultural yield probably the greatest in history, and having a valuation not far from \$10,000,000,000, with the domestic credit situation improving and with labor better employed than it has been at any time since the outbreak of the European war, there is sufficient basis for the hope for better times," states President Reynolds' letter. "The one deterring factor apparently is the uncertainty of how long the war will continue, and the immediate and ultimate effect on the world's business of the tremendous destruction of capital and life in the European conflict. Collections are far more satisfactory than they were a few months ago. The disposition generally seems to be to liquidate indebtedness and to proceed on a more rational basis.

"There are few branches in the steel and iron industry that are lagging and in which there is any unemployment. But with the immense crops, correspondents point out there should be further improvement, as, so far, the demand from railroads and building trades is not much in excess of one-half of what it should be at this season of the year. One correspondent estimates the general consumption of the iron and steel industry in this country today at about 80 per cent of normal and with an export trade running 15 to 20 per cent of capacity, he estimates that labor employment is easily on a 95 per cent basis.

"The immense surplus of gold in this country will make this an attractive market, when the war is over, for foreign countries which will be obliged to sell materials in America at a very low price in order to bring about a return of gold to those countries, this writer suggests. On the other hand, a great many who replied to our inquiries, contend that the conclusion of peace will bring with it, for a time, at least, a marked revival in business, especially on the Pacific Coast, and in the Southern states, where the exportation of lumber has practically ceased because of the war, and southern bankers and business men are almost unanimous in declaring that it would mean the restoration of prosperity there, as it would remove the difficulties confronting cotton growers.

"Indications are that our surplus agricultural production will move more slowly in export trade this year than usual, because of the activity of the German submarine in interference with international commerce. This, of course, would necessitate the greater use of credit in this country in carrying this surplus of grain and foodstuffs until it is actually needed abroad and can be transported there."
