CHICAGO BANKER SEES BRIGHT DAY DAWNING FOR COAST TIMBERMEN

George M. Reynolds, President of Continental & Commercial National Bank, Issues Bulletin on Business Outlook.

In the main, fundamental conditions in this country are pronounced sound, or at least regarded as satisfactory, by Geo. M. Reynolds, president of the Continental & Commercial National bank, of Chicago, who has just issued a summary of the bank's annual busienss review. based on 6500 letters and advicess received from all parts oi the United States.

"With an agricultural yield probably the greatest in history, and having a valuation not far from \$10,000,000,000, with the domestic credit situation improving and with labor better employed than it has been at any time since the outbreak of the European war, there is sufficient basis for the hope for bet-ter times," states President Reynold's letter.
