RAILROAD CAMP NEEDS 100 MEN

Twohy Brothers Could Use Extra Laborers on O. W. R. & N. Extension.

"We would hire 100 men on concrete work, team driving and other labor on our railroad contract if we could get them," said John Twohy, president of the Twohy Brothers company, this morning at the Northwestern National bank. This company has the contract to build the Oregon-Washington Railroad & Navigation company's Central Oregon 80-mile extension westerly from Riverside. The construction is going forward as rapidly as is possible.

"Over in Harney county, at least, there is a scarcity of labor for the railroad's construction needs," added President Twohy. "This is one indication I see that times are turning back to normal prosperity. Times are sure to be prosperous again in Oregon and the entire Pacific North. I feel the tide turning now."—Telegram.
