There are approximately 1,200 towns and cities in the United States dependent upon the national forests for the source of their water supply.

During the decade ending with the last fiscal year the Forest Service has classified and opened to entry over 15,500 individual scattered tracts in the forests,

covering over 1,700,000 acres. This classification has also resulted in eliminations, to date, of approximately 15,000,000 acres additional.

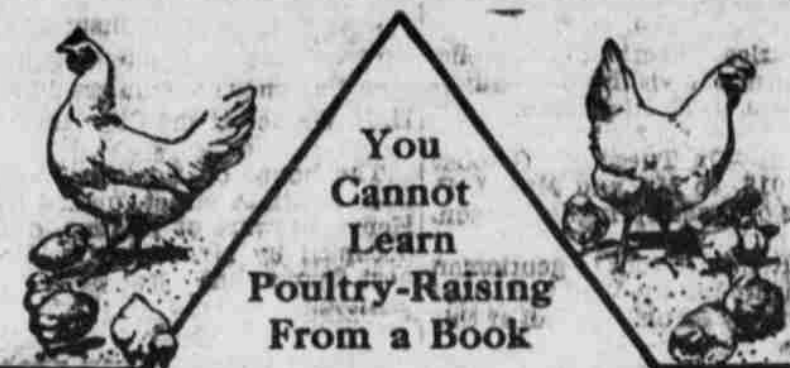
