### SUNDAY LAW HELD VALID

Act is Not in Contravention of Religious Liberty is Decision Federal Judge Wolverton.

Portland, Ore. Jan. 3.—Judge Chas. E. Wolverton in the federal district court today, upheld the Oregon Sunday closing law as constitutional and in effect. He declined a petition of the Brunswick-Balke-Collender company that an injunction be issued restraining district attorneys in several Oregon counties from prosecuting violations of the law.

The Sunday closing law was enacted by the legislature in 1864, but for years past had been regarded as obsolete. It prohibited the transaction of business on Sunday by mercantile houses, theatres, grocery stores, pool and billiard halls and places of amusement of all kinds. The only places allowed to do busi-

ness were bakeries, hotels and undertaking establishments.

About three months ago an association of grocers undertook to enforce the law against several groceries which were doing business on Sunday. Dan Kellaher, a grocer, was convicted in the justice court, but took an appeal. Before final determination was reached Judge Gantenbein, in the circuit court, granted a petition for a temporary injunction to restrain enforcement of the law in Multnomah county. While this case was pending, a like case was brought in the federal court. It was on this case that decision was rendered today.

"That the law is sometimes called a Sunday law," says Judge Wolverton, "does not alter the question, and the interpretation must be made by a consideration of the act itself."

This was in reference to the contention that the law is in

contravention of religious liberty.

"Nor does the fact that the law has been little enforced require its nullification now," says the decision.

### LICENSES BRING IN MUCH

\$5950 Paid in Lane County by Hunters and Anglers.

The sum of \$5950 was taken in by County Clerk S. M. Russell during the year 1915 for hunting and angling licenses, but only the sum of \$187 was turned back to the county as its share of the fund. Under the new law passed by the last legislature five per cent of the sum taken in for licenses reverts to the counties where the licenses are sold, but this law did not take effect until May 22. The \$187 received by Lane county represents five per cent of the amount take in after hat date.

During the year 2099 anglers

licenses were sold in Lane county, bringing in \$2099. Hunting licenses to the number of 2777 brought in that many dollars, and combination hunting and angling licenses to the number of 522 brought in \$1044. Three non-resident hunters' licenses brought \$30.

Already the hunters of Lane County are beginning to take out their 1916 licenses. Duck hunters are now using them.
