BUILDING A TOWN

In the course of a recent editorial on city building, and Eugene's chances of being the second city in Oregon, the Register says:

"All over the country there are strategically located tank towns and whistling stations that relied wholly upon their natural advantages, while not far away are hustling cities that built themselves up in the face of obstacles. Natural advantage alone will never make a great city."

The statement is indeed true. It is the co-operation and the push on the part of citizens that put cities ahead. Natural location, and the beneficence of outsiders may help a little, but it is not safe to trust to these alone. A year ago a beet sugar concern was in the field about Springfield, looking for a location. It left seed to be tested, but no one here took any care to see that these tests were carried out, and the result was the tests failed; the sugar company had nothing on which to base estimates for a factory, and the investment of half a million dollars in Springfield is deferred.

Springfield has just as good an opportunity of being the second city of Oregon as has Eugene. We are just as favorably situated as regards the center of the state, and the confluence of many rivers, as is Eugene. Our freight rates from Portland and from the east are identical with those of Eugene. We have just as much and just as desirable territory on which to locate a great city. All that is needed is a little push—a little effort to bring to Springfield business enterprises that might seek some other location. Now let's get busy.

THE PUBLIC WILL FOOT THE BILL

Since 1904 the wages of railway employees in train service on the railroads of the United States have increased about 40 per cent but the "wages" of the railroad itself (the rate per ton-mile for performing the service) have actually decreased 6.02 per cent. In other words though paying their employees more the railroads have charged the people less. Probably lower rates are due to reductions by federal and state railroad commissions more than to voluntary reductions by the railroads, but this

does not alter the fact that the less cost to the public. However, by rate reductions on the one hand and increased wages, taxes and cost of material on the other, the margin remaining for interest, dividends, improvements and extensions is now so small that if the employees succeed in their demands for \$100,000,000 more a year railroad commissions will likely have to start revising rates upward instead of downward. In other words, the situation is such that these demands concern the public more than the railroads from the fact that they are inseparably linked with an increase in rates.

Railroad employees could not choose a more inopportune time to ask for a general advance in wages. When the devastating war in Europe is over the question confronting American wage earners will be that of finding a market for their labor instead of fixing a price for it.—James J. Hill.
