NO NEW HIGH SCHOOL

The voters of the Springfield school district Monday turned down by a heavy vote the proposition to bond the district for \$30,000 for a new high school. Saving of taxes that would be required for interest was given as the reason for the defeat. Inasmuch as the premium bid for the bonds would have paid half of the interest for the first year, and the repairs that will have to be made will cost twice what would have been saved in interest, it is hard to see where the real saving lies. Within a year or two a new building will have to be built. Perhaps some fairly good barn will be available when the present building becomes entirely unusable.

THE TOWN BEAUTIFUL

This is an age of tourists and touring. People keep their eyes open as they pass through towns, anxious to see what refinement and civic spirit they can find. A town that beautifies its public streets and that has attractive residence grounds draws interest from all over a state.

Towns ought to take the greatest pains to beautify the streets through which this

stream of motor travel is passing, also to clean up neighborhoods through which railroad tracks run. When motorists find dilapidated buildings, ill kept grounds, stables decorated with circus posters, etc., they carry away a disagreeable impression.

The view from the railroad car is usually one of tumbled down chicken coops, piles of ashes and rubbish. Property owners perhaps say to themselves that the strangers that pass by won't know who it is that keeps such a looking place. All the same, they know the name of the town.

Many towns, realizing the importance of the effect produced on travelers, take pains to make little park spots near railroad stations and along main streets. It is astonishing what a change can be made in a dingy square by planting a few trees and shrubs.

Every town should have a committee to look specially after the appearance of these arteries of travel. The owners of property abutting on them should be urged to co-operate in a general cleanup and beautification movement. If a railroad won't clean the rubbish out of its right of way, the townspeople could better afford to do it themselves than to let it remain. If a screen of trees could be planted along the back yards adjoining railroad tracks, the traveler in a few years would get a wholly different impression of the place. —Albany Herald.

WILL TEACH THRIFT IN LANE COUNTY SCHOOLS

Board of Education and Eugene Banks Formulate Plan of School Savings System

The Eugene Clearing House Association, comprising the three leading financial institutions of the city, the First National Bank, the Eugene Loan & Savings Bank, and the Bank of Board of Education a system of Commerce, have submitted to the school savings that has met with the unqualified endorsement of the Board, and "thrift"—the cornerstone in the material welfare of the individual and nations—will be instilled into the young minds of the pupils of the public schools.

This is certainly a step in the right direction.

At a time in life when the minds of children are most plastic and susceptible to the influence born of the wisdom of maturer years. When habits—and saving is but a habit—are most easily formed, and bad habits are most easily broken.

The invitation to join the thrifty little army is extended to every public school child in Lane County, whether he or she be in attendance at a city or a rural school.

The Bulletin would be glad to see both parents and teachers encourage this splendid movement. It means much to the future of any child.

The plan of operation is most simple. Deposits will be accepted by any of the three banks mentioned in as small amounts as ten cents. A bank passbook is issued to the aspiring young financier in which each deposit

is entered in the usual way, and as the little hoard grows into larger denominations, the thrift of the child is correspondingly stimulated. When amounts of one dollar or more are accumulated, the amount can be transferred to the regular savings department of the respective banks and interest paid thereon.

As a banking proposition the plan is of course a profitless one, as the expense of his clerical labor entailed to keep accurate account of the minute transactions will probably be considerably greater than the earnings of the sum total of the deposits, of which the banks must act as faithful custodians. However, the profit idea is not the determining factor in the movement. It is an educational idea along rational economic lines, and the Eugene banks are certainly to be commended in getting behind it to assure its safety and permanency.
