Meters will be installed on the services of those consumers who persist in using water for irrigation purposes outside the above hours.

Only one hose is allowed to be used for each lot or major fraction thereof that service is being paid for.

In no case will customers be allowed to use hose without nozzle, sprayer or lawn fountain attached.

The use of water during a fire is strictly prohibited, except for protection of property.

"Note that former irrigation rates were 50c per month, on yearly contract, making \$6.60 per year.
