COUNCIL WANTS CHANGE

fourth day of October, 1909. The proposed amendment to amend section 2 of said charter and to change the boundaries of the said Town, to be and to read as follows:

Be it enacted by the people of the Town of Springfield:

The Town of Springfield does ordain as follows:
Section 1. That section 2 of an act entitled "An Act to incorporate the Town of Springfield and to repeal all acts relating to the incorporation of the Town of Springfield, and all acts amendatory thereof," filed in the office of the Secretary of State, February 10, 1893, and which section 2 of said act was amended by the people at an election held on the fourth day of October, 1909, within the said town and within the territory annexed to said Town at said election, be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 2. The corporate limits of the Town of Springfield shall be as follows: Commencing at a point on the north bank of the Willamette river, at the southwest corner of lot three in section thirty-four in township seventeen south, range three west of Willamette meridian, running thence north 22 degrees east 2311.98 feet to the southeast corner of the R. E. Campbell D. L. C. No. 59, in said town and range; thence north along the east line of said D. L. C. 1284 feet; thence east to a point of intersection with the east line of the Oregon & California Railway Company's right-of-way to the intersection thereof with the north line of North F street as platted in the Springfield Investment & Power Co's addition to the Town of Springfield, thence east on such north line of said street to the point of intersection thereof with the center line of Third street as the same is platted in said addition; thence northerly on such center line of Third street, extended, to the point of intersection of such line with the south line of the County road on the north line of the B. F. Powers' D. L. C. No. 48 in said Town and range; thence easterly and northerly on and along such south and east line of said County road to the intersection thereof with a line drawn through the center of the west half of Section 25 from north to south, in said town and range; thence south on such line, through the center of the southwest quarter of said section to the south line thereof; thence east on the line between sections 25 and 36 in said town and range 20 chains to the "quarter" corner on said line; thence south on the center line through said section 26 to the center of the Mill Race; thence northwesterly down the center of the Mill Race to the point of intersection with the east line of Fourth street in the Town of Springfield; thence south on such line to a stone corner, which is 184.65 feet south of the south line of south C street in said town; thence south 73 degrees and 15 minutes east 1090 feet; thence south 690 feet; thence west to the center of the Willamette river; thence northwesterly down the center of said river to a point due south of the place of beginning; thence north to the place of beginning.

Section 3. That section 2 of an act entitled "An Act to incorporate the Town of Springfield and to repeal all acts relating to the incorporation of the Town of Springfield, and all acts amendatory thereof," filed in the office of the Secretary of State, February 10, 1893, and which section 2 of said act was amended by the people at an election held on the fourth day of October, 1909, within the said town and within the territory annexed to said Town at said election, be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:
